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RC Basic Training Courses to Be Held Here June 25 to 29

One of the first Red Cross basic training courses in home service will be given at Red Cross headquarters, 123 North Third avenue, Hillsboro, from June 25 to June 29 inclusive, with the Washington county chapter acting as hosts for the meeting. Representatives will attend from Yamhill, Polk, Tillamook, Columbia and Lincoln county chapters.

Increasing numbers of veterans returning to local communities make it imperative that all chapters insure that home service is adequately prepared to meet its responsibility to these men and their families as well as to the families of men who have died. In addition to this increasing responsibility, services to active servicemen and their families must continue unabated, according to E. S. Osborn of San Francisco, regional director.

Plans for this training course provide for six persons, one each from six chapters, to meet in a central community for five days for instruction from an area instructor. This instructor will give five sessions of home service and two on practical assistance in organizing and conducting chapter classes for chapter instructors. The other three sessions will be devoted to individual presentation of home service material by each chapter person in the class.

Basic training plan is a concerted effort to bring training for home service volunteers to all chapters, said O. B. Gates, chairman of the county chapter.
