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Fire Destroys Shute Home

SHUTE — Fire completely destroyed the home of Mr. and Mrs. Phil Cullinan Wednesday afternoon. Starting on the roof, it progressed rapidly before help arrived. Several of the larger pieces of furniture were saved before the house collapsed. The Cullinans moved here in January.

Used Car Ceiling Cut Four Per Cent

Ceiling prices for used passenger cars will be reduced four per cent July 1 in accordance with the "rollback" provisions of the used car price regulation, according to E. J. Klein, automotive price specialist, OPA. The reduction in price applies to used cars sold by either dealers or private owners, Klein explained.

Also to be reduced four per cent on July 1 are charges allowed for extra equipment on used cars such as heaters, radios and other built-in items for which additions to base ceiling prices are permitted.

B-6, C-6 Gasoline Coupons Out Soon

B-6 and C-6 gasoline coupons, which local war price and rationing boards stopped issuing in March, will not be good for consumer use after June 30. Most of these coupons have already been used, but the few remaining will be taken out of circulation, in line with OPA's customary policy of periodic invalidation of gasoline coupons.

Consumers who have any of these coupons that represent an unexpired ration may exchange them for valid coupons at their local boards.

Service station operators will have 10 days, or through July 10, to surrender these coupons to their suppliers for gasoline, or to their local boards for ration checks. Distributors have until July 20 to deposit these coupons in their ration bank accounts.

OSC Students Ask for Building Measure Vote

OREGON STATE COLLEGE — Just before leaving for their homes OSC students did their bit toward getting a favorable vote on the \$10,000,000 postwar state building measure by sending out more than 7000 letters to acquaintances over the state urging them to vote 300 X yes at the special election June 22.

Students set up their own organization, distributed prepared letters to living groups on a night set aside for it, and urged each one to send at least five letters personally addressed and signed. The letters told about the importance of the measure and explained the financing plan under which a property levy is not a property tax but merely authorization to use existing income tax surpluses.

Mrs. Buckingham Rites Held Here

Funeral services for Mrs. Margaret Buckingham, a former resident of this community, were held June 5 at the Tualatin Plains Presbyterian church north of Hillsboro. Rev. Henry Young officiated.

Margaret Buckingham was born in Scotland December 22, 1860, and when a child came to Washington county with her parents, Rev. and Mrs. George Ross. Their home was what is now the Mrs. Emma Dierdorff place, and it was there that Margaret Ross was married to Thomas C. Buckingham on October 6, 1880. To this union eight children were born, four of whom survive.

For the past 16 years she had made her home with her daughter at Duluth, Minn., and the body was shipped here for burial in the cemetery at the church where her late father was the minister for many years, being the first pastor of the church.

Mrs. Buckingham is survived by three sons and one daughter—Ross D. Buckingham of Kalispell, Mont.; Thomas G. of Nepequin, Wash.; Arthur of Jackson, Wyoming; Mrs. Marybelle Toole of Duluth, Minn.; and a number of grandchildren and great-grandchildren. She is also survived by two sisters, Mrs. Emma Dierdorff of Hillsboro, and Mrs. Mary Schaefer of Linnton.

Lumber Production Shows Big Decline

Lumber production declined about 11 per cent in the first quarter of 1945 compared to production in the first quarter of 1944, WPB reported. Lumber authorized for distribution in the third quarter of 1945 totals 8,833,000,000 board feet of which 4,833,000,000 board feet are allotted to large industrial users. WPB Chairman J. A. Krug says that "increased production of pulpwood and lumber in the United States is absolutely essential to the successful prosecution of the war in the Pacific." He has reemphasized that essential requirements for forest products have not been lessened by the end of the war in Europe.

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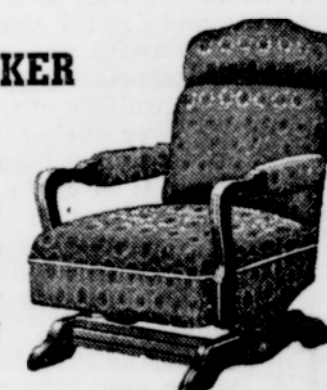
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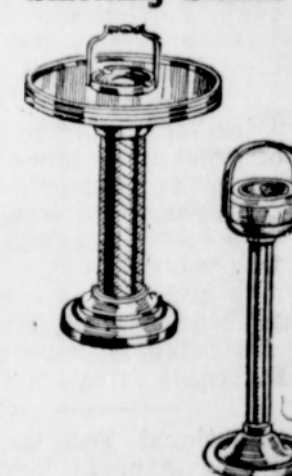
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
