## Cherry Growers Urged to Apply Fruit Fly Spray

Sweet cherry and sour cherry growers should begin control measures for the cherry fruit fly at once according to a report received by Palmer S. Torvond, county agent, from Robert E. Reider, plant pathologist, Oregon State college. The first spray should be applied to all varieties of cherries, to inter-planted trees and fence rows. Grower spray formulas are recommended, any one of which may be used.  
Formula No. 1 — Lead arsenate 2½ pounds, water to make 100 gallons of spray. Add to this mixture one of the commercial spreaders consisting of skimmed milk two quarts, and hydrated lime four ounces. If cherry leaf spot or brown rot is a problem, add cherries, add lime sulphur two gallons; on sweet cherries add wettable sulphur six pounds. If the sulphur is added to spray, leave out the spreader.  
A second application should be applied at the peak of fly emergence or about two weeks after the first spray. If a third spray is necessary due to heavy rains, apply two weeks after the second spray. This application is not a bait spray. It should be applied as a complete cover spray. Wettable sulphur should be substituted for lime sulphur in the second or third spray to lessen the danger of spray injury.

Formula No. 2 — The following dust mixture can be used instead of the spray: Lead arsenate 10 parts, finely divided dusting sulphur 125 parts or finer 99 parts. The dust should be applied thoroughly and should be repeated after heavy rains. The same number of applications are recommended as for formula No. 1. This sulphur lead arsenate dust is recommended instead of lead arsenate and lime because the sulphur helps check the brown rot and leaf spot diseases.  
Formula No. 3 — For growers wishing to use a non-poisonous spray, the use of rotenone is suggested. Results of recent experimental tests indicate that four per cent rotenone 3 pounds, plus 2½ gallons of molasses, to 100 gallons of spray will control the fly. This spray should be repeated weekly until the cherries are harvested. The spray should be a complete cover spray.  
Formula No. 4 — The cherry fruit fly bait spray can be used if molasses is available. This spray includes the following materials: Lead arsenate 1½ pounds, rotenone two quarts, water to make 10 gallons of spray.  
This spray is applied as a thorough bait spray. The spray should be applied on the upper surface of the foliage as a fine mist spray. All parts of the trees should be reached. Interplanted trees and fence rows should be sprayed. The first should be applied now without delay. Later sprays should be applied at seven-day intervals until one week before harvest. Royal Ann or other early ripening cherries should be sprayed after the cherries are harvested.  
Caution: Cherries that are to be sold for fresh fruit consumption should be washed. This precaution need not be taken if cherries are sold to canneries for canning — they will be thoroughly washed at the cannery.
