Nazi Prisoner Returns Home

SCHIFFLIN—T. Sgt. Allen Schiffelin, liberated from a German prison camp on April 22, arrived home Monday for 60 days. After this time he will report to Santa Ana, Cal., for reassignment. Schiffelin stated that February was his hardest month in the prison camp because no parcels came through and food was short. He has gained about 30 pounds since being liberated. He received only one piece of mail while in the prison, that from his sister, Mrs. Herb Sahnaw Jr. He met Carl Romeike from near Forest Grove while in the prison camp.

Word that he is safe and well has come from Sgt. John Frank in Germany, to his mother, Mrs. J. F. Teller of Reedville. Sgt. Frank fought on the front lines in Europe nearly eight months. His wife, Mrs. Frank, whose home is in Nashville, Tenn., recently arrived for an indefinite stay with Mrs. Teller. Second Lt. Robert Mulloy, son of Mr. and Mrs. W. E. Mulloy of Sherwood, has been reported as liberated from a German prisoner of war camp. Enlisted in July, 1942, he was first listed as missing in action with the air forces and later reported as a prisoner. He attended Sherwood high and Pacific university.

Cpl. Kaufman Home
Cpl. Ivan L. Kaufman, son of Mr. and Mrs. J. A. Kaufman of route 5, Hillsboro, is home on a 30-day convalescent leave. Cpl. Kaufman will report back to the barnes hospital after his leave.

John Perkins Reports Back to Hospital

John Perkins left yesterday to report back to Barnes General Hospital, Vancouver, Wash., after spending a 30-day furlough at the home of his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Perry Perkins, of near Hillsboro. He has been at Barnes hospital since January, after being wounded October 27, 1944, in the Philippines.

Pvt. Perkins entered the service in November, 1942, and received infantry training at Camp Roberts, Cal. He then went overseas where he served for a year before being wounded with the 24th division. He wears the Purple Heart, good conduct ribbon, and Asiatic-Pacific ribbon with three stars.

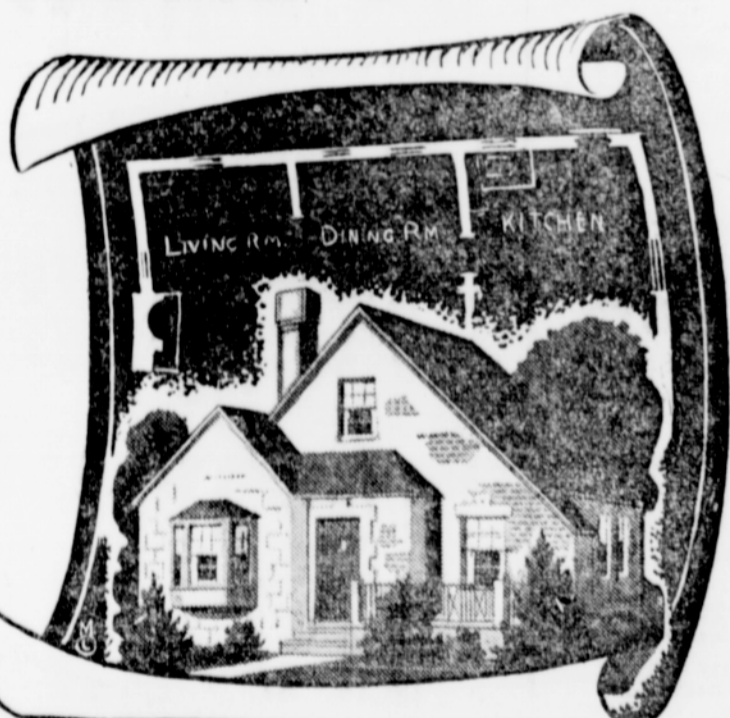
