

Growth of Pacific "U" Pointed Out By Dr. Giersbach; Capt. Ross to Talk

Enrollment at Pacific university now at 692, is at its highest in the history of the institution, Dr. W. C. Giersbach, university president, told Hillsboro Rotarians Thursday. Material increase in student numbers is expected to bring it up to 1000 in the postwar period, asserted the educator.

The campus has grown from 30 acres to 154 acres at present, the biggest share of the increase being due to the gift of an arboretum from the Consolidated Timber company.

Several new courses have been added including typing and shorthand, journalism and home economics. It is planned to give master's degrees in education. The faculty has grown from 22 in 1941 to 34 in 1945. Dr. Giersbach said the student coming to Pacific is enabled to get closer to his teachers than at any other school on the coast. The university, he said, may also take over the North Pacific College of Optometry. The university budget has increased from \$72,000 four years ago to an expected \$200,000 for the coming school year, according to the university head, who pointed out that 23 per cent of this comes from student fees.

The importance of Pacific university to Washington county was stressed by the university executive, who declared that the school had saved county students and parents \$30,420 the past year. Much of the financial support for the school should come from this area, he said.

Captain Ned Ross, 41st division veteran of the South Pacific, will speak at the luncheon today. Morris Weil will be chairman. Charles Walker was in charge last Thursday.
