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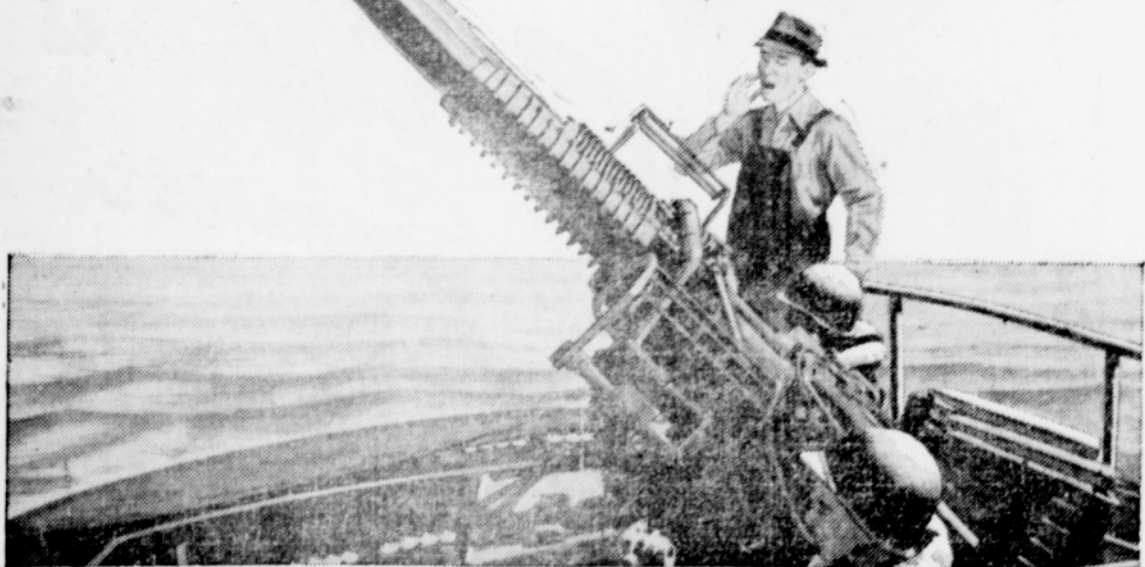
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News of Men and Women in Uniform

Veteran Pilot Home on Leave

First Lt. LaVerne Abendroth, air force veteran, arrived home Tuesday from the European theater of operations to spend a 30-day leave with his wife and son and parents, Mr. and Mrs. F. Abendroth, of Hillsboro. From here he will go to Santa Monica, Cal., for reassignment.

He enlisted December 26, 1941, was commissioned in June, 1943, and went overseas as a pilot of a B-24 in March, 1944. After 21 months of combat in the European theater, he was assigned to a fighter squadron and took part in 50 missions.

He prefers a pursuit pilot to a bomber. The veteran pilot was home on leave for 30 days in February and on returning to active duty in England served as a flight commander. He was awarded the air medal and five oak leaf clusters.

First Lt. Hess returned from the United States in a B-17, stopping off three days in Iceland.

Hillsboro Man on Yank Team in Spain

MADRID, Spain—An American baseball team composed mainly of amateurs from the United States embassy colony, holds first place in the Madrid area of Spain's first "world series," in which 12 teams are participating.

"Los Yanquis" (the Yankees), managed by Emmet Hughes, Summit, N. J., pitcher, and Melvin Alton, East Oak street, Hillsboro, Ore., catcher, posted a 10-inning upset victory over a Madrid club Sunday to take the lead.

The American squad will fly to Barcelona next Sunday in a United States naval attaché's plane to play an exhibition engagement against the Barcelona Athletic club, champion in the seven-team Barcelona circuit. The game will be played in the city's largest stadium in connection with the Barcelona international samples fair.

Marine Corps headquarters in Portland have announced that the marine corps is again enlisting 17-year-old men into its ranks. All physically fit men in that age group may apply at 208 New U. S. Courthouse building in Portland.

According to Major Norris E. Lineweaver, Portland district recruiting officer, "the men who want the marine corps are the men we want."

Seventeen-year-old men may enlist in the marine corps reserve for the duration of the national emergency or in the regular marine corps for a period of four years. Following enlistment, they will be sent to San Diego for "boot" training.

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Lt. Hess Returns From Long Service

MIAMI FIELD, Fla., June 20.—Lt. Ralph T. Hess of Hillsboro was one of a group of veterans of the Mediterranean theater that landed at the air transport command's Miami army air field after serving nearly three years in that region.

Traveling on a 2,000,000 mile a day transportation system—the ATC—these vets are a few of many returning here at the rate of 50,000 per month by air.

Lt. Hess was active with the 3d and 34th infantry divisions. His father is Fred G. Hess, As well as the MTO, he wears the Silver Star, Bronze Star, Purple Heart and Distinguished Unit citation with six bronze service stars.

All men will continue immediately to a plane-to-train operation—to Camp Blanding, Fla., where they will be routed to separation centers close to home. Later, after furloughs, they will be re-assigned or released from the service of Uncle Sam, depending on their valuable points accumulated.

Lt. Hess arrived in Hillsboro Tuesday night for a short stop. He had to report to the Lewis W. Walker MTO, where he was assigned to a furlough.
