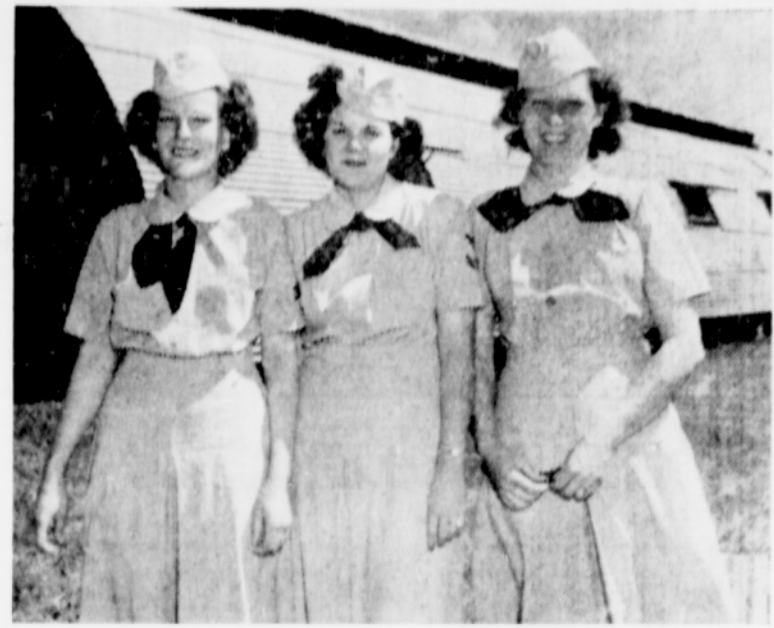

Ration-free Shoes Due July 9 to 28

Consumers will have a chance to buy men's and some styles of women's "odd lot" shoes ration-free and at mark-down prices when a small percentage of these shoes is released during the three-week period July 9 through July 28, according to OPA. Dealers are asked to limit sales to one pair to a customer.
The "odd lot" release is necessary to put into useful service the odds and ends and broken sizes of shoes that accumulate after every selling season. In normal times these shoes are disposed of through clearance sales, but under rationing consumers do not like to pay ration stamps for them.
These "odd lot" shoes must be sold at prices at least 25 per cent below those charged on June 1, 1945.
Women's shoes with heel heights of one inch or less may not be included in the release, as these shoes are usually the type worn by growing girls and must be rationed carefully to spread the supply.

Seasons, bag limits and other regulations governing the taking of game birds, game animals and fur-bearing animals will come up for consideration at that time.



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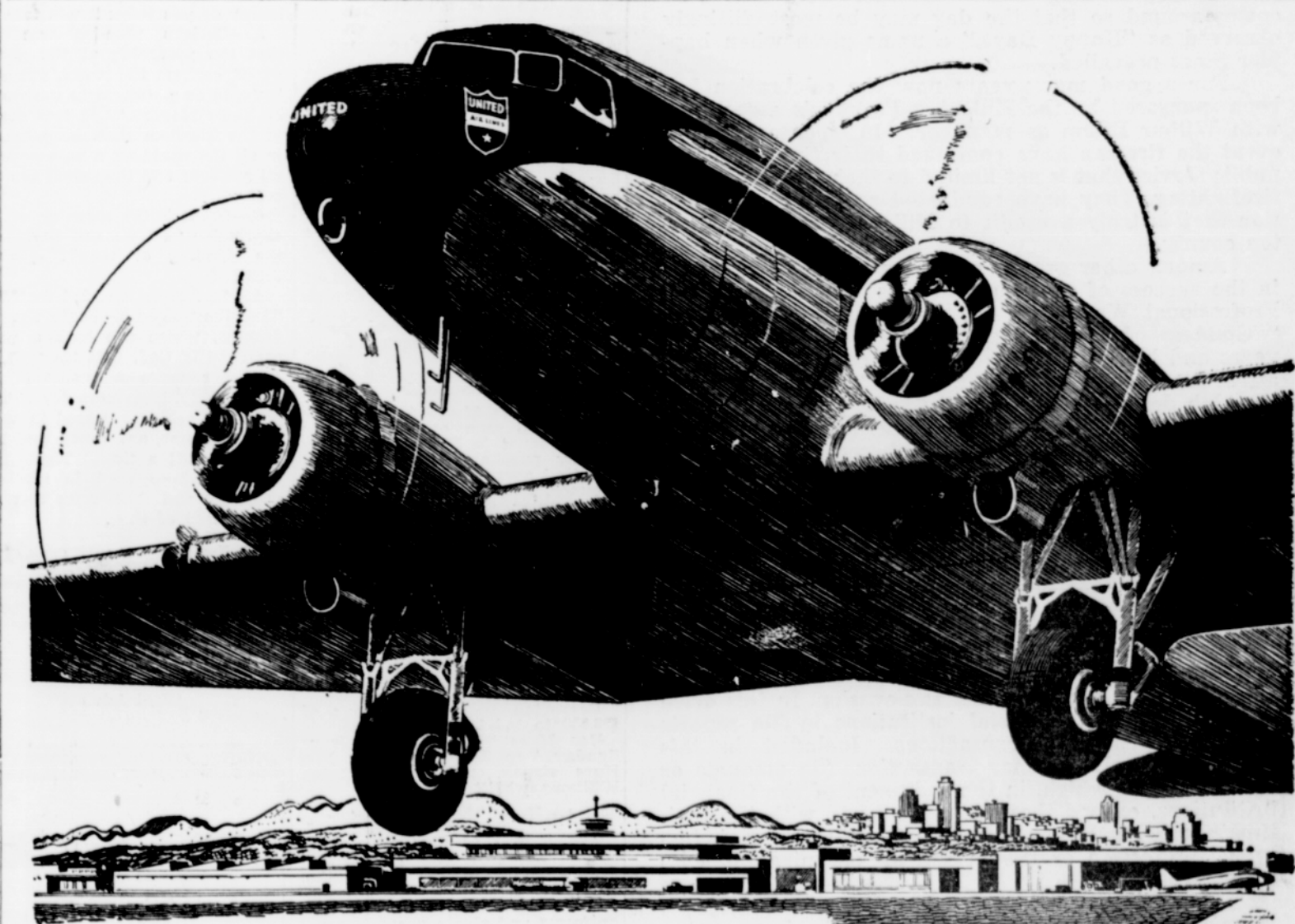
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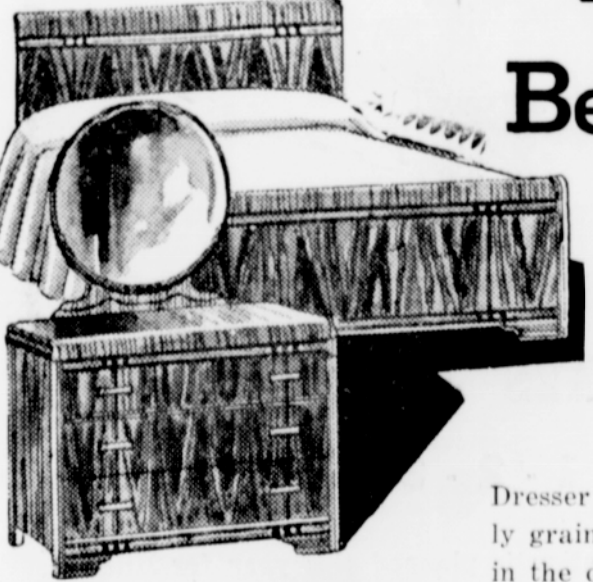
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
