Shortcake shorts

FRUIT OR BERRY SHORTCAKE

3 cups all purpose flour 1 cup shortening
4 tsp. baking powder 1 egg
2 tbsp. sugar 1 cup milk
1 tsp. salt 4 cups sweetened fresh fruit or berries

Sift and measure flour, sift again with baking powder, sugar, and salt. Cut in shortening until mixture is very fine. Beat egg; combine with milk; then stir into flour mixture. Knead gently; roll out about 1/2 inch thick.

FAMILY SHORTCAKE

Divide dough in half; pat gently into two 8-inch cake pans. Bake in hot oven (450° F.) about 20 minutes. Split while warm; fill with sweetened fruit or berries. Serve with top milk or whipped evaporated milk or coffee cream.

HOW TO WHIP EVAPORATED MILK OR COFFEE CREAM

Pour evaporated milk or cream into freezing tray of refrigerator. Chill until ice crystals start to form around the edge. Place in chilled bowl and beat vigorously with rotary beater until thickened and fairly stiff. Flavor with a few drops of vanilla.
