Mr. and Mrs. Alfred Bothum and children have moved into the A. Rieger house. The Bothums expect to build on their acreage as soon as possible.

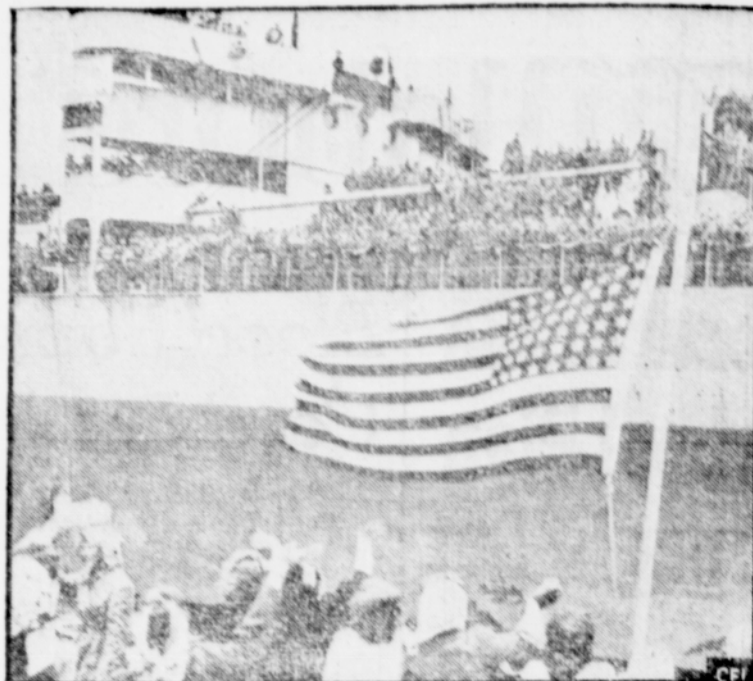

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Long Resident Of County Dies

COOPER MOUNTAIN—Funeral services for Alexander Reusser, 79, were held at St. Paul's Mortuary at Heaverton June 28. Interment was in the Evangelical cemetery on Cooper Mountain. He died June 26 after an illness of two and a half years during which he was helpless and bedfast.

Mr. Reusser was born November 9, 1865, at Hiltteringen, Switzerland, moved to Ohio at the age of 19 and came to Oregon four years later. He was married to Luella Tomi July 14, 1893, in Portland, and they moved to Cooper Mountain, where he maintained his home for 35 years. Two sons and three daughters were born to the union. Mrs. Reusser died April 24, 1928. Mr. Reusser and family resided in Tillamook county from 1919 to 1927, during which time his place was rented. On March 28, 1927, he was married to Mrs. Susy Griffiths, in Portland.

Interested in the welfare of the community, he took an active part in church and school affairs, serving in many capacities, including school district No. 94. He was a charter member of the Cooper Mountain Evangelical church. At the time of his death, he was serving as a director of the Cooper Mountain cemetery.

Mr. Reusser was a member of the Antioch Baptist church in Portland and lived a consistent Christian life.

Deceased is survived by the widow, Susy Reusser; five children, Bertha Masterson and Edna Heard of Beaverton, Rev. Fred C. Reusser and Alex C. Reusser of Portland, and Florence Griffiths of Klamath Falls, seven grandchildren; one great grandchild, two sisters, Ida Eberly of Seapooose and Mrs. Emma Berger of Switzerland, and a brother, Hans Reusser of Switzerland.

Employment in State Declines

More than two-thirds of the 12,112 decline in Oregon's covered employment during the past year occurred in Multnomah county, but losses of a few hundred also came in Umatilla, Clatsop, Clackamas, Jackson, Columbia, Clatsop, Polk and Lincoln.

Reports to the unemployment compensation commission show Multnomah's covered workers went down from 190,975 to 182,719. The figures, covering the period from March, 1944, to March, 1945, give 286,343 as the latest state total.

The best increase was in Marion county which took third place from Klamath with 9177 covered employees. Wasco with its new war plant, Linn and Lane counties showed smaller gains. The latter easily held second place with 13,087 workers reported.

Slight gains were shown by first quarter payrolls, which failed to reflect all of the year industry cuts that came in February and March. The three months' total of \$188,009,254 was slightly higher than the same period a year ago, but seven per cent under the last quarter of 1944.
