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American Planes Hit Heaviest Blow At Nips; Carrier Force Near Tokyo

Nearly 2000 American warplanes, ranging from giant B-29s to naval carrier planes and Mustang fighters, piled destruction on the Japanese homeland Tuesday in the greatest single day air assault of the Pacific war. Virtually all land-based air forces in the western Pacific collaborated in preparing the way for a 1600-plane dawn raid on Tokyo by the fast carrier force of the powerful 3d fleet, which steamed close to the Nip home island. Admiral Nimitz in precedent-shattering communique named 26 of the ships and 14 of the commanding admirals while strike was in progress.

Jap air forces refused to put up anything resembling a real fight over Tokyo Tuesday as U. S. planes destroyed or damaged 152 enemy planes on the ground and shot down two snipers near the fleet.

Secretary of Navy Forrestal told the nation Tuesday night that Adm. William F. Halsey is proving that the U. S. Navy now controls the sea right up to Japan.

Tokyo and surrounding areas were hit by the 3d fleet's carrier force with a mighty final blast that wrecked at least 173 Nip aircraft and 32 ships. It marked the 36th straight day of the pre-invasion bombing of Japan. The fleet withdrew without an inch of an answering shot from the stunned enemy.

From Kunming, Lt. Gen. Chen-nauk said the 11th air force had achieved its first objective of sweeping Jap planes from China's skies.

In Five-Way Strike
Several hundred Superfortresses made another five-way strike on industrial targets in Japan Monday. It was revealed that Superforts had flown at least 6442 sorties in 40 days, dropping almost 42,000 tons of bombs, and Mitchell bombers had joined the attack.

Japs Abandon Salient
Chinese Central News agency reported Wednesday that Jap forces were hurriedly abandoning their entire salient in South Kiangsi province. It appeared that the Chinese were gradually gathering steam for an all-out blow against the Jap transcontinental corridor across China.

Aussies Win Ground
In Borneo, Australian troops secured completely Balikpapan harbor and the great Pandanari oil refineries.

Geiger Gives Views
Lt. Gen. Roy S. Geiger, marines' new commanding general in Pacific ocean area, says a big invasion against the Japanese can be staged any time the U. S. wants to mass the forces to do it—and "with no trouble at all."

Nomura Warns
Admiral Nomura, former Jap "peace envoy" to U. S., Sunday warned allies that they will have to "shed blood" if they insist on unconditional surrender of Japan.

Peace Feels Scored
Japan's vague peace feelers brushed aside Tuesday by Acting Secretary of State Grew with a sharp reminder that the U. S. is interested only in the enemy's unconditional surrender.

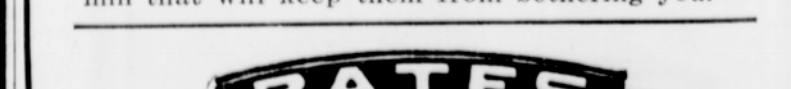

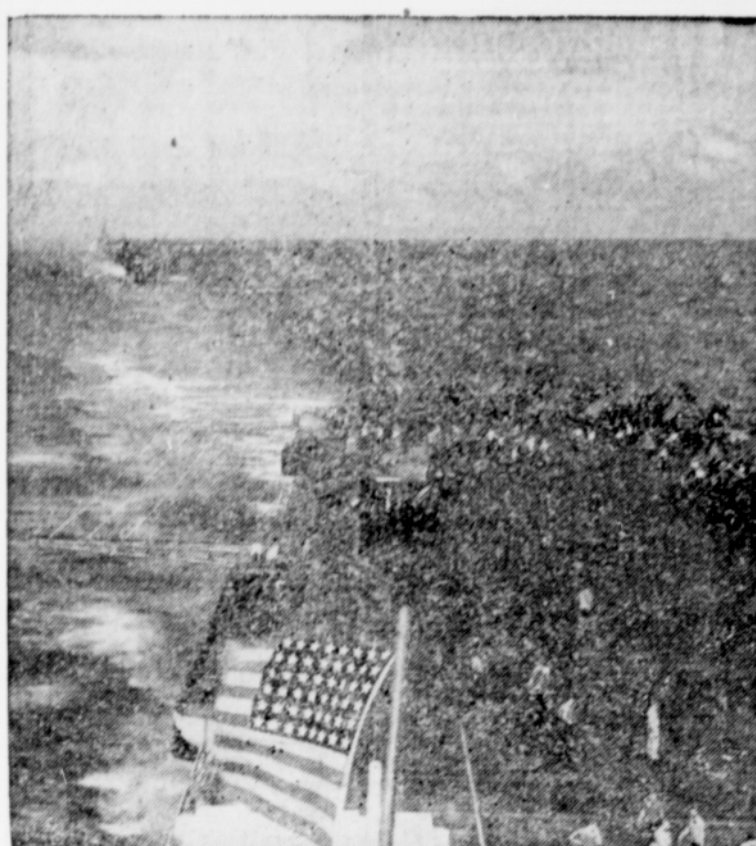
