In a letter received from Richard S. Jackson of Portland, nephew of Mrs. E. A. Griffith, and who has made many friends in and around Hillsboro before going into the service, reads as follows:

"I look forward with anxious impatience for the end of hostilities and the day when the ship on whose deck I stand passes under the Golden Gate bridge and into San Francisco harbor. That is the day that every man and woman over here is looking forward to. May I say that were it not for the American Red Cross here in Brisbane, Australia, life for the GI would be pretty difficult. Your donations have helped to provide a four-story building with facilities for eating, sleeping, dancing and services such as sewing, pressing, barber, showers, sight-seeing tours, and helping with personal and individual problems. I am the only haven for American soldiers either stationed here or passing through and truly deserves a vote of thanks from all of us, and a thanks to you for helping."
