Warrant Officer George R. Tweed of Portland, son of Mrs. Rosemary Bennett of route 5, Hillsboro, famed for having hid from the Japs for more than two years on Guam, was married Saturday night in Washington, D. C., to Dolores Kramer, 29, formerly of Milwaukee, Wis.

The 43-year-old Portland-born navy radioman dodged the Japs on Guam for 31 months, then escaped to give valuable information to American assault forces fighting to recapture the island.

It was the third marriage for Tweed. His first wife died in San Diego and he was divorced from his second wife, Mary Tweed, 27, by whom he had one child.

Tweed enlisted in the navy at Portland in November, 1922. He served on the aircraft carrier Saratoga and other ships before the war, then served on the battleship Colorado immediately before being assigned to Guam.

On Guam he lived like a hunted animal while dodging the Japanese conquerors. Natives helped to feed him, and for more than a year he lived in a cave. He escaped on July 10 last year, only ten days before the American invasion. He received the legion of merit from Secretary of the Navy James V. Forrestal, and was promoted to ensign on his return to the United States.

His father, Samuel Tweed, lives at Ada, Ore.
