

Red Cross Training Courses Praised

At the Red Cross meeting Thursday night at headquarters, O. B. Gates, county chairman, gave an interesting report on the regional meeting held in Roseburg June 11 to 13, and reports on home nursing and nurses' aides instructions as given at Roseburg were told by Misses Corinne Pennington and Elizabeth Panck.

Mrs. Estelle Kroeger, home service secretary, reported on the basic training course in home service work given here June 25 to 29 by Miss Ruth Schneider of the area office. She said this course was very beneficial to home service workers as every phase of the work was explained.

Four directors were added to the county Red Cross board: Mrs. Guy Payne of the Oreno community; Mrs. Rex Wilson, Forest Grove; C. J. Stickney, Aloha; and F. L. Brown of Laurel.

Monthly reports were given as follows: Treasurer, Mrs. Mary B. Clappshaw — Receipts for month: Donation \$5, plasma 35 cents, void check \$1, total receipts \$7.35; balance on hand at beginning of period \$17,048.92; total to be accounted for, \$17,056.27.

Disbursements: Home service \$248.85; first aid \$18; motor corps \$26.49; production \$240.06; war fund expense \$28.55; administration \$36.44; emergency closet \$8.10; plasma \$66.45; total disbursements for period \$1,039.54; balance July 1, 1945, \$16,016.73.

Home Service, Estelle Kroeger, secretary — Case volume: Continued from last month 50; intake during month 85; cases closed during month 69; cases continued 66; home service personnel on duty 8; volunteer hours of work 68; financial assistance given \$446.95; repayment for assistance given \$11.

Motor Corps, Mrs. R. W. Well, chairman — Eight trips to Portland via Garden Home, 28 hours; 416 miles; two girls set up work at blood bank, two hours; one girl worked at blood bank 5 1/2 hours; total 35 1/2 hours, 740 miles.

Production, Sewing, Mrs. Gene G. Carver, chairman — No shipments during last month; 25 layettes and other articles nearing completion; many groups working on afghans to meet the needs of army and navy hospitals; five

pleated afghans, seven quilts, nine baby quilts, two pairs pillow cases, 1 pillow and pillow ticking and two children's garments donated to production the past month. Twenty ladies put in 135 hours in the rooms during month and approximately 140 ladies over the county put in around 1672 hours.

Knitting, Mrs. Minnie G. Cull, chairman — Ladies are working on V-neck sleeveless sweaters. We have plenty of yarn and more knitters are needed.

Counseling, Mrs. J. L. Kovaly, chairman — Eleven volunteer workers from the Forest Grove unit served 144 blood donors and lunch to volunteer workers, with other nurses, approximately a total of 240 persons on June 15.

Nursing activities, Miss Corinne Pennington, chairman — Home nursing conference at Roseburg attended by two nurse instructors; nurses' aides, hours of service 32 (blood bank 16 and well baby conference 16); nurse recruitment pamphlets distributed and interviews held with several prospective student nurses.

It was announced that dramatic programs "For All Humanity" were being given by the Red Cross over KEX each Sunday night at 7:45.

Stalder Clan Has Annual Reunion

A special feature of the afternoon was the presentation of the Stalder service flag. Forty boys were reported in the armed forces and there have been no casualties. It revealed the hardships and courage of a pioneer family which emigrated from Switzerland to America in 1876, and established a home at Bethany, Ore.

The day's activities ended with a baseball game, with the older and younger generations participating. Attending from this vicinity were Mr. and Mrs. T. Bronkewicz and son Gordon of Hillsboro, Mr. and Mrs. Elwood Newman and son Norman of Oreno, and Mr. and Mrs. Emil Stalder of Bethany.

Red Cross Makes Urgent Appeal for Hospital Workers

An additional and urgent appeal for more workers to serve in army and navy hospitals with the American Red Cross has been received by O. B. Gates, chapter chairman, from Verne Simmons, Pacific area manager.

"The national quota of 3000 workers has not yet been filled," Simmons said, "and it must be at once in order to supply increasing numbers of returning American casualties with the care they need."

Most in demand are young women between the ages of 23 and 35 who have college degrees in sociology or psychology and would be qualified as trained social or recreational workers. Young women in the same age group with experience in hospitals or with the sick are also urgently needed to serve as untrained or semi-trained hospital workers.

Under the supervision of the hospital's medical staff, Red Cross workers secure needed information about the patient's family and background, help interpret the patient's problems to his family.

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view the patient of government benefits to which he is entitled, provide recreation suitable to his condition, and help with other social, welfare and personal problems.

Mr. Simmons explained that new salary scales are now in effect in most classifications. Living quarters or allowances if quarters are not available, are provided in addition to the salary. Demand for Red Cross recreational services will not diminish even long after V-J day," he concluded.

Anyone interested in a hospital position is urged to apply at the nearest local Red Cross chapter. Positions in the Red Cross service to able-bodied at military installations are also open.

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Do you know this about Summer Desserts

Desserts for Summer should be light textured, time-saving and eye-appealing. This delicious sponge-like cake with its colorful whip topping is one tempting example. And the delectable Fruit Pockets make for welcome variety.

FAIRY SPONGE CAKE

1 cup all-purpose flour 1 cup sugar
1 tsp. baking powder 1 tsp. vanilla
1/2 tsp. salt 1/2 cup hot milk
2 eggs 1 tbsp. butter or margarine

Sift and measure flour, sift again with baking powder and salt. Beat eggs well with rotary beater; add sugar gradually and continue beating until mixture is very light. Add dry ingredients and stir until smooth. Add flavoring. Heat milk to boiling; add butter or margarine; stir quickly into batter. Pour immediately into 9-inch well-greased and floured cake pan and bake in moderate oven (350° F.) about 20 minutes or until done. Remove from pan; cool on rack. Serve topped with Fresh Fruit or Berry Whip. Recipe follows.)

FRESH FRUIT WHIP

Soften 1 tablespoon unflavored gelatin in 1/2 cup cold water, then dissolve in 1/2 cup hot water. Combine 1/2 cup sugar, 1 1/2 cups crushed fresh berries, 1/4 tsp. salt, and 2 tbsps. lemon juice; add to gelatin. Chill until thick and syrupy; beat with rotary beater until foamy. Fold in stiffly-beaten whites of 2 eggs. Chill until firm.

FRUIT POCKETS

Use your favorite biscuit dough recipe. Roll dough about 1/4 inch thick, cut into six 4-inch squares. Place about 1/2 cup sweetened fresh berries or sliced fruit in center of squares. Fold over diagonally; press edges together well with fork. Prick top to allow steam to escape. Bake in hot oven (450° F.) 15 minutes; reduce heat to moderately hot (400° F.) and continue baking 15 minutes longer or until done.
