Improvements Made On Poultry Houses

BANKS—E. A. Olson and sons are remodeling their poultry and brooder house to house 10,000 young chickens. They now have 2000 Nue Hampshire R-birds and each week will receive 1000 young chickens. They will sell 150 of these as three-day-old chicks to local people. After 12 weeks 800 fryers will be placed on the market weekly. They now have 4100 young turkeys on range on their farm north of Banks. These were brooded in their poultry house before chickens were placed there. A third floor is being added to the building. This and the second floor will be of hard surface and the first floor of concrete. The building will be painted white inside and the outside walls covered with shakes. When completely remodeled it will be one of the most up-to-date poultry plants in the state.
