Regulations on Hunting Fixed

The 1945 hunting regulations tentatively were set by the Oregon State game commission when it held its annual hearing in Portland on July 14. The hearing was adjourned until July 28, at which time the final regulations will be passed.

There will be no special cow elk tags issued this year although the same area in Southeastern Oregon will be open to the hunting of elk of either sex on the regular tag. The elk season will be from November 2 to 25 inclusive, but that part of the state west of the summit of Cascade range will be closed to hunting with the exception of the eastern half of Lane county.

The deer season will be open from September 29 to October 29 for buck deer having not less than forked horns. There will be no special doe deer tags issued except for a post-season shoot to be held in the Fort Rock-Silver Lake area from December 1 to 5, inclusive. The fees for these tags are \$3.50 for residents and \$5 for non-residents, in addition to the regular hunting license fees.

There also will be issued 800 tags for the taking of antelope with ear-length horns. The season will be from September 22 to 30 inclusive. Fees for antelope tags are \$2.50 for residents and \$5 for non-residents.

Drawings for both the doe deer and antelope tags will be held at dates to be published later if the number of applications exceed the number of tags authorized. In this area, Washington, Clatsop, Columbia, Multnomah, Clackamas and Yamhill counties, is October 15 to 17. Bag limit, two males a day but not more than four per person. Silver gray squirrels may be killed in Washington county and other nearby counties September 15 to October 20, inclusive.

Income Tax Is It

There will be no "forgiveness" rebate on your income tax payments next year. That alluring target for the legislature and the voters, the millions in income tax revenues, is all shot up. There is not enough left this year to cover all the items for which funds were appropriated or initiated. The state and county school fund of \$10-per-pupil-per-year will not be liquidated this year as it is too far down on the preferred list. Preceding this fund is the general state expense, within the six per cent limitation, amounting to \$6,000,000; veterans' loan and educational funds and higher education support of \$3,000,000; state building fund of \$2,000,000; elementary school fund of \$2,000,000; and the district school support fund of \$2,000,000. The reserve fund (the Walker "cushion") of \$5,000,000 was set apart in 1944 for the specific purpose of relieving property taxes whenever income tax revenue surpluses are not sufficient to pay the general expenses of the state.

Auto Accident Claims

Motor vehicle accidents during the past year cost the state \$1,000,000. The state fund, which pays for treatment for injured persons injured in accidents, now amounts to nearly \$200,000. Of this amount paid out \$364,400 for doctors' fees, \$16,213.50 for hospital and nursing charges, \$12,500 for ambulance charges. Since the fund was established in 1941 a total of \$79,457.81 has been paid out on all claims, most of it going to hospitals. The fund is raised from license fees.

To Correct Traffic Courts

The first meeting of the state traffic court committee, Justice George Rossmann of the state supreme court was elected permanent chairman. The work of the committee is to recommend to the National Automotive association to improve traffic court procedure, create a greater respect for the law and enhance public safety. It is the conclusion of the national headquarters that too many decisions in minor violation cases are made on a bargaining basis by justices of the peace and other officers who have as their principal objective the collection of fines rather than constructive correction.

Army's Program Approved

The first meeting of a college education immediately at a selected college or university is available to the young men of Oregon who have been notified of their eligibility. The army's specialized training reserve program, with courses important to both the individual and the army, has the approval of Rex Putnam, Oregon superintendent of public instruction. Following a conference at the capital this week with Capt. S. W. Rawls Jr. of the ninth service command headquarters, Putnam said that the young men of Oregon and their parents would give consideration to the benefits of ASTEP. Applicants should talk to their school principals if they wish to take advantage of the courses, Putnam added.

No Sugar Allotted Alcohol Beverages

No sugar has been allocated for the manufacture of beverage alcohol in connection with the July "liquor holiday," the war food administration and the war production board said in a joint announcement.

They stated further that no sugar had been allocated for this use during the two past "releases" of distillery facilities for the production of beverage alcohol. The three agencies added that they do not anticipate any future allocation to beverage alcohol manufacturers "for as long as sugar remains in tight supply."

Oregon should find trapped oil. Two of the crews, with headquarters here at the state capital, are "shooting" in the central Willamette valley. The system termed "shooting" means setting off a dynamite charge placed down 50 to 100 or more feet and the recording of the reaction of the shot on a hundred or more seismographs placed on the surface around and about the shot. In this way a survey and map of the subsurface structure is made that trapped oil may be located. The possibilities of locating oil here are not too far down in the "if" column either, at least the Standard, Texaco and Richfield companies think well enough of it that each is spending from \$50 to \$500 a day on its crews.

Income Tax Totals
Fifteen times as many people in Oregon paid income tax during the past 12 months as during the same period in 1933. Income taxes collected during the fiscal year totaled \$16,116,967 of which amount \$13,934,599.47 was collected during the first six months with \$2,182,367.50 from corporations and \$10,478,285.68 from individuals.
