Mrs. Belle Hartwick is confined to her bed, having had a light stroke Tuesday at the Bob Brown home, where she stays.

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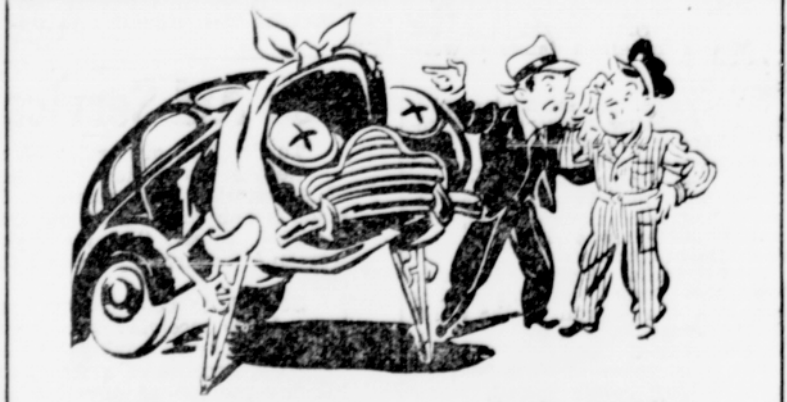
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
