Roy Officer Has Close Call in Okinawa Fight

ROY — Following adventure of Lt. Donald P. Spiering of Roy on Kakazu ridge on Okinawa appeared in "Stars and Stripes" learns Carbine Nomenclature The Hard Way.

The lieutenant likes the carbine as a weapon but there's one thing he doesn't like — the carbine's safety release button on the rifle's left side.

The recommendation dates back to when an assault was launched on Kakazu ridge. The lieutenant, Donald P. Spiering, became separated from his platoon during a patrol and lost in enemy territory.

For seven days he attempted to find American lines. Sleeping in caves, hiding in burned huts and haystacks, subsisting on carrots and cabbage.

Then two armed Japs discovered him lying in a field.

They were too astonished to do anything, Spiering said. "They stood gazing at me. I jabbered something in their ears and they came into firing position."

"Instead of pushing the safety I made the mistake of pressing the magazine release button. I still don't know how I got away with that one."

What followed belongs to Ripley. Spiering kept gibbering, replaced the clip and squeezed the trigger. "I didn't stop firing till I killed both of them," he said.

Editor's note: Lt. Spiering said he was only back of enemy lines three days instead of seven as printed in "Stars and Stripes."

LAUREL — A directors' meeting was held Monday evening at the Laurel school to discuss the hiring of a second teacher, bus service and work to be done on the school house.

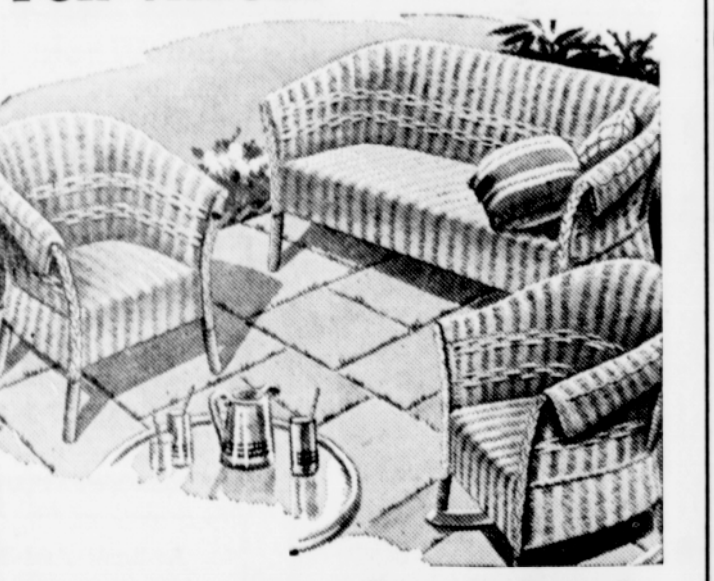

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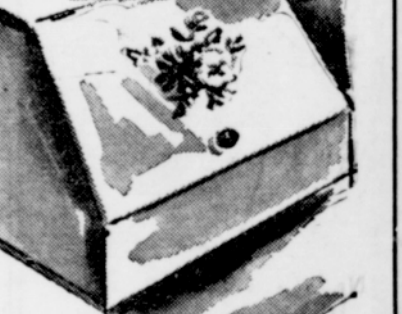
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
