

Cecil Davis, Red Cross Disaster Director, Visits

Cecil Davis, Red Cross disaster field representative for the Northern security district, will be a visitor at the Washington county chapter August 20 to 22, when he reviews chapter disaster preparedness programs with Kenneth Wilcox, disaster chairman, assisting area chairmen and others.

"During the fiscal year 1944-45, American Red Cross disaster relief services were extended to some 40,000 victims of 243 disasters, which occurred in 41 states at an approximate cost of \$3,500,000," Davis said. "These operations provided emergency food, clothing and housing to persons effected by such catastrophes as the hurricane which lashed sections of the North Atlantic coast in September, the Ohio valley, Tennessee, Mississippi and Louisiana fields, and the Port Chicago explosion."

Mr. Wilcox, chapter disaster chairman, stated that it was only through extensive preparedness and planning that the 3757 chapters throughout the country have been able to effectively and quickly extend traditional disaster services regardless of the size or location of disaster. "Here in Washington county, our disaster preparedness planning extends throughout our territory, including all of Washington county. This means that throughout our chapter and branch structure, we are constantly ready to meet any disasters which may occur, extending services of registration and information, mass feeding, housing, and medical care."

Mr. Wilcox also pointed out that Red Cross long range rehabilitation care is another vital Red Cross service to disaster-stricken communities. In this phase of service, persons are aided in re-establishing themselves as self-dependant and supporting members of the community. This assistance is extended on an individual case work basis, and according to need."

Davis is well acquainted with Red Cross disaster services. Until he joined National Red Cross disaster service in June, 1944, he had served for two years as a volunteer in this important service for

Major Gen. Kirk Praises Aides

A commendation by Major General Norman T. Kirk, surgeon general of the army, for service performed by the Nurses Aide Corps has been received by O. B. Gates, chairman of Washington county Red Cross chapter.

Stressing the fact that the nurses' aides have relieved an acute shortage of nurses since the program was undertaken, General Kirk expressed appreciation to members of the corps in a letter to Basil O'Connor, National Red Cross chairman.

"I want to take this opportunity to thank the Red Cross for the wonderful work performed by its corps of nurses aides," the surgeon general's letter reads.

General Kirk also praised the resident and non-resident volunteers. Testimonials from all over the country show that these women have performed their duties in an outstanding manner."

Explaining that the army nurse drive has brought sufficient numbers of nurses into the service for the present, General Kirk lauded the corps members for coming to the aid of the army at a time when it was feared the sick and wounded servicemen would not receive adequate nursing care.

Mrs. Walter Lippmann, national director of the Red Cross Volunteer Nurses Aide Corps, stated that although the need for nurses in army hospitals is leveling off, services by corps members seem to be required increasingly elsewhere.

The corps today includes 195,213 certificated aides, who have been trained in 2,253 hospitals in all parts of the United States as well as Hawaii and the Canal Zone.

1 Package M.C.P. Pectin

Wash, peel, and remove pits from 4 pounds fully ripe peaches; grind the fruit. Measure exactly 4 level cups of the ground peaches (add water to fill out last cup, if necessary) in a large kettle. Add the M.C.P. Pectin and lemon juice, stir well and bring to a boil, stirring constantly. NOW, add the sugar (which has been previously measured).

Continue stirring, and bring to a full rolling boil. BOIL EXACTLY 4 MINUTES. Remove from fire, let boil subside, stir and skim by turns for 5 minutes. Pour into sterilized jars, allowing 1/2-inch for sealing with fresh paraffin.

Canning With Less Sugar

Water Pack... Fruits may be canned satisfactorily without sugar by boiling water or fruit juice in place of sugar syrup. Absence of sugar may cause some loss of color and flavor in the fruit.

Corn Syrup & Honey... Corn syrup or honey may be used to replace up to one-half of sugar specified in canning syrups. Corn syrup has one-half the sweetening power of sugar.

To Make Syrup, Using Corn Syrup... Combine sugar, syrup and water, then bring to boil.

To Make Syrup, Using Honey... Combine sugar and water, bring to boil. Add honey, stir and bring to rolling boil. Skim. Honey imparts its characteristic flavor to fruits. The use of a mild-flavored honey is recommended.

It is best not to use brown sugar or molasses in canning.
