Rev. Mark Lappen Dies on Vacation

Rev. Mark W. Lappen, well known in Hillsboro years ago when he was pastor at St. Matthew's Catholic church, died July 10 in Los Angeles, Cal., a day after he had been stricken ill while on vacation. Funeral services were held July 16 at St. John's church. He was stationed at St. John's Evangelist church at the time of his death.

Father Lappen was born in Lowell, Mass., October 22, 1882, and after receiving his education was ordained by Cardinal Farley at St. Patrick's Cathedral, N. Y., June 13, 1908. He served as pastor of St. Matthew's church from about 1911 to 1914. In August, 1915, because of poor health he went to the Diocese of Denver, and in 1938 he went to San Francisco, where he had remained since.

A notable event that occurred in San Francisco was his work in helping convert Joe Rosenthal, AP photographer who took the famous picture of the flag-raising on Mt. Suribachi, Iwo Jima.
