Threat to City Watershed Less

from Cherry Grove through the Trask watershed toward Tillamook, it was reported Tuesday. This is virtually the only route for equipment through the mountains in this area due to deep canyons and lack of roads.

Fire burning in the vicinity of the north fork of Trask river, west of Forest Grove, is still burning ground, burning south into the Tillamook burn area. The Hembre ridge fire in the Jordan creek district which developed into a serious threat Monday was being fought with additional equipment.

In the north the Cook creek blaze south of the Nehalem river is still serious, but in the northeast front at Cochran crews are being released for other fronts, leaving that sector on a patrol basis. Backfiring north of the Consolidated camp near Glenwood has been successful.

The most recent flare-up in the Tillamook burn started the middle of last week when rising wind and lower humidity whipped up dormant flames. Spot fires in the vicinity of the Forest Grove watershed last Wednesday brought a call for volunteers to fight the flames and to establish a patrol in the area. Although there were no serious fires in the watershed, flames were out of control nearby.

Thursday a flare-up of burning snags threatened the Consolidated Timber Co. sawmill near Glenwood. Crews moved in with pumps to cool off the area and build new trails around the camp. Crews also set a backfire around the camp on the north side of the Wilson river highway. Fires on other fronts were reported to be making slow headway.

Friday flames were reported raging along Hembre ridge in the Jordan creek district and heading toward green timber in operations of the Portland Sawmill Co. Fire pumps were called into action in the Forest Grove watershed where the fire threatened to jump trails into the timbered area. The fire near Consolidated Timber Co. was reported under control again Friday.

Saturday the flames were being kept in bounds over most of the Tillamook burn area and principal fire fighting activities were centered in the Forest Grove watershed and Hembre ridge area.

Saturday night and Sunday the fire boiled up again as high winds returned and the humidity dropped low. The flames broke over into Sain creek of the Hillsboro watershed. Rolling flames swept down Hembre ridge at the southwest end of the main Wilson river fire, jumped fire lines and forced fire fighters into retreat. A new danger area was reported in the northwest corner of the Salmon-berry burn. A large spot fire developed southeast of the main fire within eight miles of Cherry Grove.

Monday the fire broke out of bounds on the Scoggins creek and raced south into timbered country from which Forest Grove and Hillsboro get their water. Fire

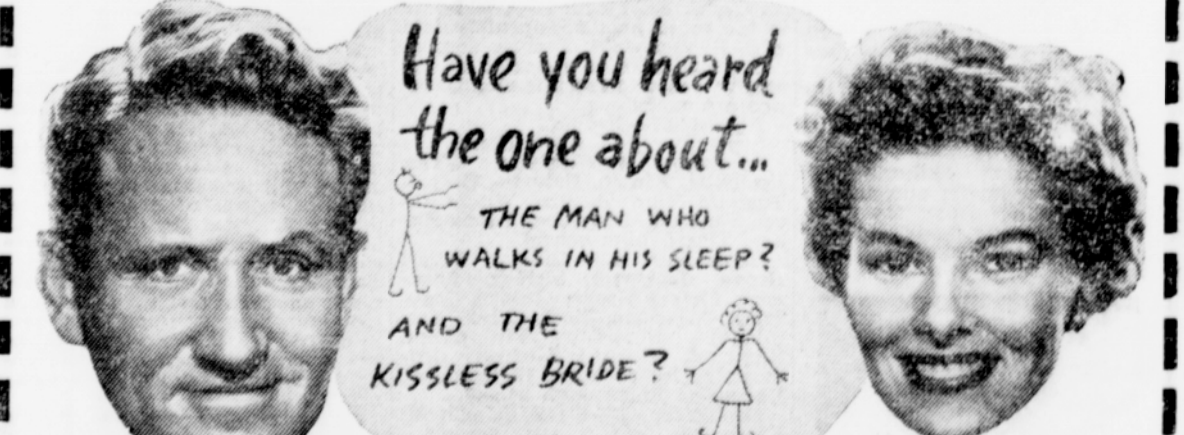
