

Surrender Will Be Signed on Ship August 31

General MacArthur announced Wednesday that the surrender of Japan would be signed aboard the Battleship Missouri in Tokyo Bay on August 31. He also stated that the Japanese already have a copy of the surrender document that will be required to sign.

Gen. Douglas MacArthur announced Tuesday that he would leave quickly for conquered Japan at the head of a mighty array of army, navy and air forces and would dictate surrender articles in the enemy homeland within 30 days.

FARM War News

Editor's Note—This is a weekly feature presented in cooperation with the County USDA War Board, and designed to keep farmers advised on new developments in agriculture's wartime production program.

Reflecting a need for conserving transportation, the government is making loans on a basis for the first time. Loans will average 45 cents per bushel nationally, and will be made only on oats grading number three or better.

The oats crop is estimated to be the largest in 25 years and this year's wheat crop is expected to break all records. With the current transportation system already overburdened by movement of war materials, producers are being asked to store their oats under loan.

It is up to the farmers who sell their sheep and lambs to buyers other than agents authorized by the government to protect themselves so that the prices they receive will reflect the subsidy payment.
