Standardization On National Scale

Standardization of equipment on a national scale for the new freedom gas kitchen to provide necessary convenience for the home-maker is the nation-wide project sponsored by the gas industry, announced J. A. H. Dodd, district manager of Portland Gas & Coke company.

"Formerly," declared Dodd, "there had been little dimensional coordination in the equipment of various suppliers, and the assembling of the units for a finished kitchen presented manifold difficulties in the way of securing smooth streamlining."

"To eliminate these difficulties and to simplify the planning and building of better kitchens in new homes or old," Dodd explained, "the gas industry secured the interest of the steel and wood cabinet industry and of gas appliance manufacturers in working out uniform dimensions so that cabinets and cabinet-sinks might be built in sizes to fit smoothly with gas ranges and refrigerators in practically all kitchens. By virtue of the measurements agreed upon, each unit can be placed in relation to its most convenient use to obtain good functional kitchen design."

Dodd laid special emphasis on the fact that in instances where fixtures do not permit the complete kitchen, or a fully remodeled job at the beginning of the home-making may save the kitchen planned and started under the basic standardized dimensional plan, adding equipment correctly over a period of two or three years by following the program worked out by the gas industry for that purpose.

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5 Good Country Tricks for Saving More Used Fats

This year our domestic supply of fats and oils will be approximately one and one-half billion pounds less than last year. Right now, we are facing our worst fat shortage since the war began. To make up for this staggering loss, the government is depending on the women of America—and particularly women on farms and in smaller cities.

Every spoonful, every drop of fat is needed to help make battlefield and homefront essentials. So roll up your sleeves and do an all-out job, won't you? Clip this checklist and pin it up in your kitchen as a reminder.



- 1. FRIED SALT PORK**—with milk gravy. Salt pork yields so much grease, you won't need it all for gravy. Pour the rest into the salvage can.
- 2. DEEP FAT FRYING**—use the fat over and over, but when it's too dark and smelly to use any more, don't forget Uncle Sam wants it!
- 3. ROASTS AND CHOPS**—save all trimmings (scraps from plates; too). Keep them in a small bowl; once a week melt them down.
- 4. SAUSAGES**—they're better if you parboil them first. Skim the fat off the cooking water—remove the fat from the frying pan.
- 5. CHICKEN SOUP**—chill it before you use it. Scoop off the hardened grease (soup tastes better, too!)

When the salvage can is full, take it to your butcher promptly. He will give you 2 red ration points and up to 4c for every pound of used fat you turn in.
