Gresham Fair Now Under Way

GRESHAM, August 21 — A sample of farm products that have rated Oregon as a diversified agricultural state are displayed at the 29th annual Multnomah county fair, which opened Monday. Despite scores of obstacles, the state's largest county fair was held during the past war years because of the management's belief that the exhibition is a morale builder in more ways than one.

The fair is packed with chickens, rabbits, pigeons and water fowl; swine pens which have been unused for several years have been whitewashed and bedded-down to take an overflow of entries received in the swine division.

Jumbo, hailed as the largest performing elephant, is scheduled to highlight afternoon performances of Rudy Muller's miniature circus in front of the grandstand. There is also a trained camel, scores of ponies, and one of the west's foremost rodeo clowns and his trick mule.

Record number of horses have been entered in the fair association's race meeting which started Monday night and continues through Saturday.

Firmin Langue is remodeling his home.

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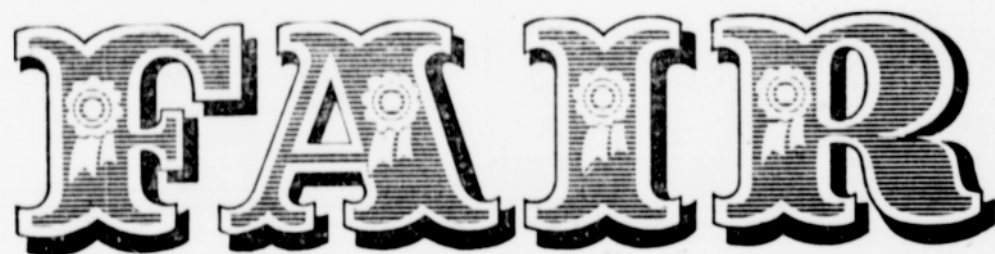
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
