Dies in Portland

Dr. Ralph Emerson Duganne, doctor of medical dentistry and prominent Pacific coast turkey producer, died August 22 at 125 NW 20th place in Portland. Recently his home had been in Salt Lake City, but he had returned to Portland for the summer.

Dr. Duganne was born April 16, 1882, at Sioux Falls, S. D., and moved to Oregon when a boy with his parents. His father, the late J. E. Duganne, was a Portland realtor.

He was educated at Pacific university, Forest Grove, and North Pacific Dental college. He practiced dentistry for 16 years at Independence, gave up his vocation to become one of the pioneers in the turkey business, and later expanded his operations to California, Utah and Washington.

His wife, Madge Imbrie Duganne, survives. Funeral services were held Friday at the Portland Crematorium chapel, followed by interment in the mausoleum. Arrangements were in charge of Miller & Tracey.

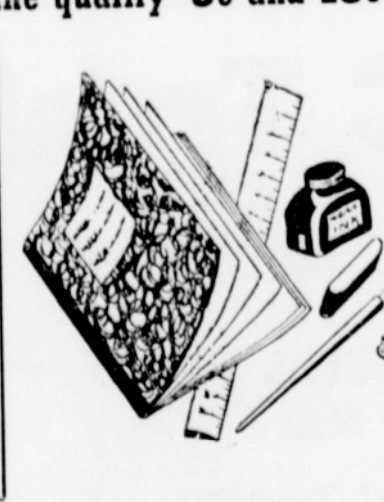

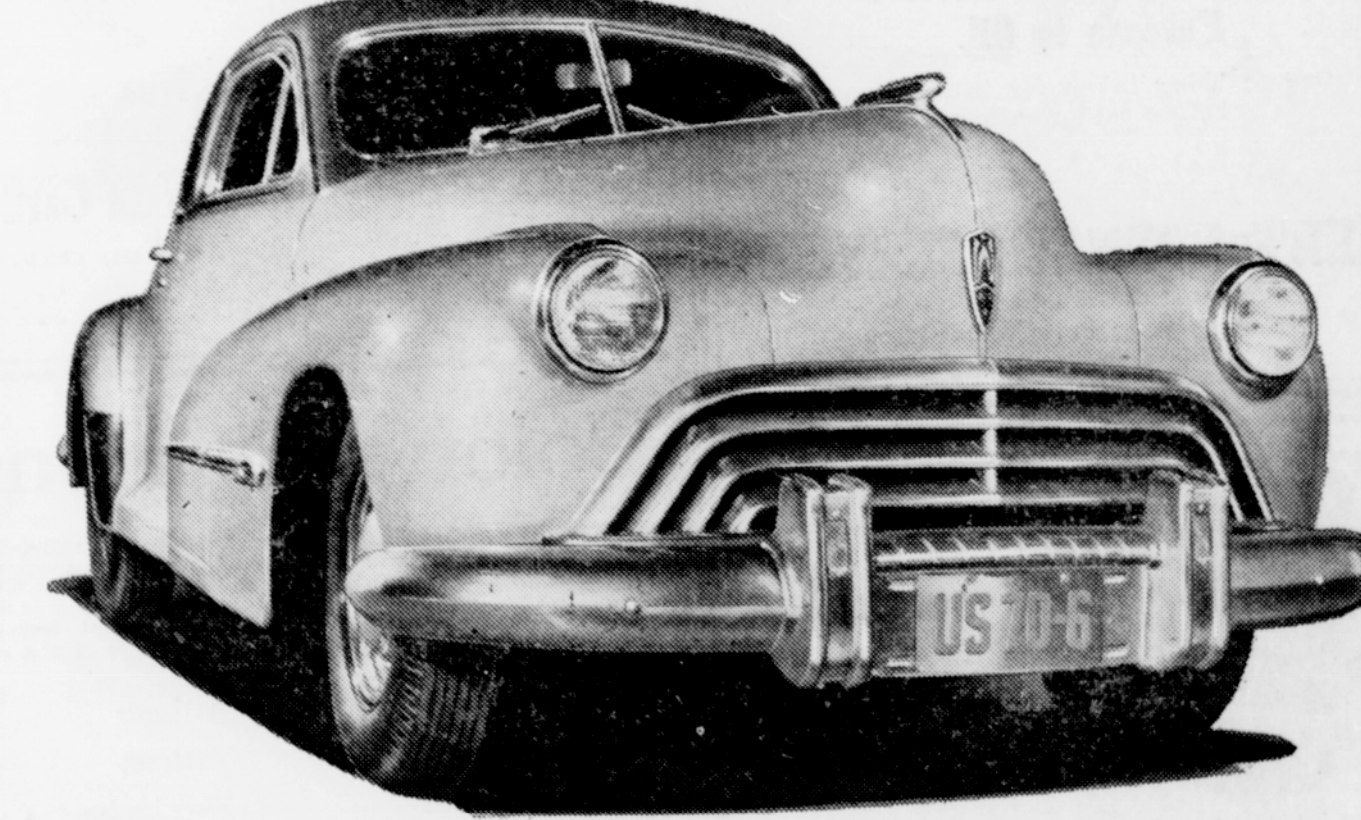
