Lester Bidwell has moved his family back to Orenco so his little daughter can start to school next week.

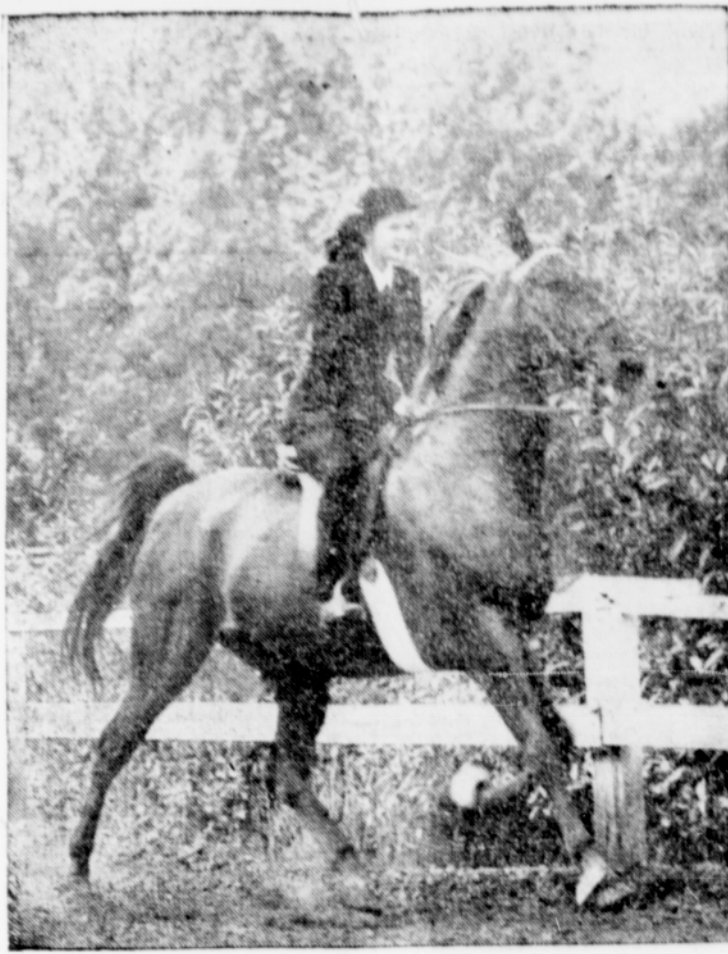

Beaver Gridders Start Practice Next Saturday

OREGON STATE COLLEGE, Corvallis—A squad of about 40 men is expected to greet Coach A. L. "Lon" Stiner and his two new assistants, Bill Howard and Quentin Greenough, Saturday morning when football practice starts at Oregon State. The Beavers will be returning to the grid spot after a two-year absence caused by the war.

It will be an almost entirely inexperienced squad that will revive football at Oregon State with the result that the Orange coaching staff will have to build from the ground up. Bob Stevens, a sophomore alternate quarterback on the 1942 club, is the only letterman expected back.

Only two other men who were on the campus when the Beavers withdrew from football in 1943 will be on hand Saturday. They are Lew Hassman, former Albany high player who won his numerals as a guard on the 1942 freshman team, and Murle Anderson, former Baker high athlete who was a freshman candidate for quarterback on the 1943 eleven before it folded.

The fact remains that the bulk of the squad will be made up of freshmen and discharged war veterans who will be entering college for the first time. Stiner is not discouraged, however. He believes that the young players will have lots of enthusiasm and will be capable of playing some first class football.

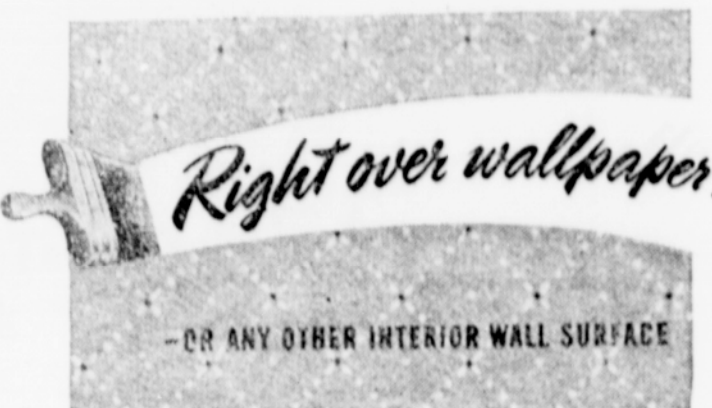

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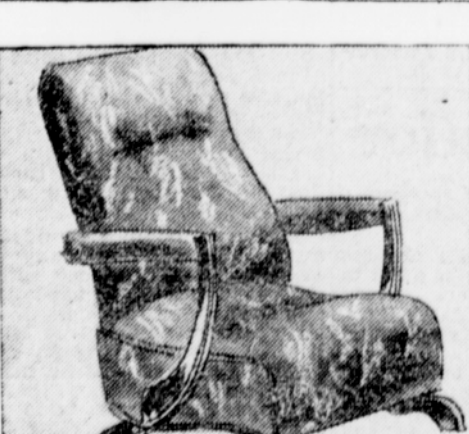
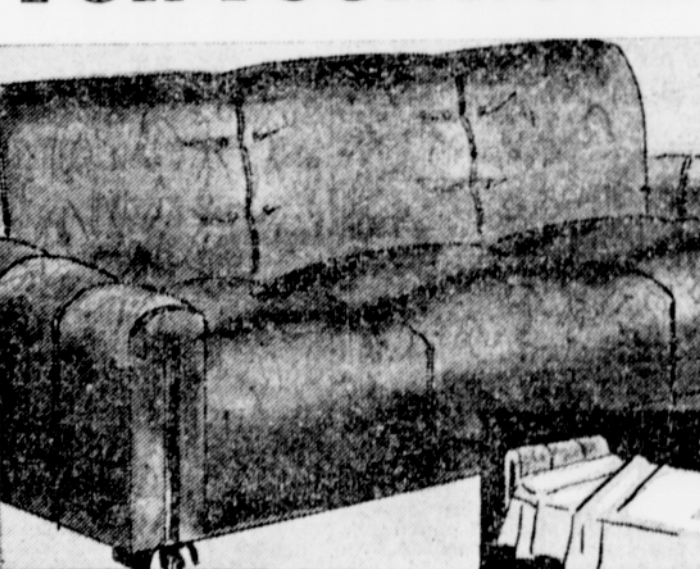
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
