Workers to Have

Special Insignia

WASHINGTON, D. C., September 11 — Active wartime volunteers in American Red Cross chapters will be presented with special insignia for "meritorious personal service," it was announced here today by National Chairman Basil O'Connor.

Red ribbon bars will be given to volunteers with 12 months' service. To the bars will be added silver stripes denoting one or more units of 500 hours' service, and gold stripes denoting 5000 hours. Volunteers with a minimum of 200 hours will receive certificates signed in facsimile by President Truman and Chairman O'Connor.

Like all certificate holders on both the paid and volunteer staff, Mrs. Estelle Kroeger, executive secretary of the chapter, is eligible for the World War II service pin. These are available to all workers who have been on duty in the United States. Similar insignia with the inscription "Overseas" are available to those who have held assignments abroad during the course of the war.

Addressing upwards of four million volunteers enrolled during the course of the war, Chairman O'Connor said: "Because of the inherent intangible factors constituting Red Cross service, medals and other decorations are not awarded except to those who died in the service. But volunteers whose contributions added so much to American morale may be proud to accept these insignia as their form of service pins."

Alterations for Ready-Mades Big Item in Buying

Buyers of ready-made clothing can save themselves a lot of labor and by giving careful attention to the kind of alterations needed and avoiding those that may be so difficult to fit as to go unworn, says Miss Lucy Lane, extension specialist in clothing and textiles at OSC. If a dress that fits through-out can't be found, it is usually best to buy one that fits the upper part of the body as the skirt is just difficult to alter, she adds. Here are some suggestions she makes.

When trying on a ready-made dress in the store, examine seams, hem and waistline to see if there is enough cloth to allow for needed changes or for possible shrinkage if the dress will be laundered.

Remember that if seams are let out, the previous stitching line will show on some materials such as jersey. Many mitts cannot be remedied. A narrow sleeve cap or back cannot be satisfactorily enlarged unless there are unusual wide seam allowances because empty shoulder seams soon tear out.

In altering, rip no more than necessary. Clip the machine stitching between places to be changed. Remove stitching carefully. Press the edges of opened seams, being careful not to stretch them. Many dresses need to be altered to have the belt shortened and then adjusted. To shorten a belt, remove the extra length from buckle end.

If the hem is uneven, first make sure that the waistline and hip line have been fitted properly before trying to mark the length. When marking the hem, wear the kind of shoes that will usually be worn with the dress. If the skirt is to be shortened, even off the turned-up part, about 1½ to two inches.
