5 Cups Squeezed Juice  
7 Cups Sugar  
1 Package M.C.P. Pectin

Wash and crush 3 1/2 pounds fully ripe grapes. Add 1 1/2 cups water and simmer covered for 10 minutes. Squeeze out the juice. Measure exactly 5 level cups of the juice, (add water to fill out last cup, if necessary), into a large kettle. Add the M.C.P. Pectin, stir well, bring to a boil, stirring constantly.

NOW, add the sugar (which has been previously measured), continue stirring, and bring to a full rolling boil. BOIL EXACTLY 2 MINUTES. Remove from fire, let boil subside, skim carefully. Pour into sterilized glasses, allowing 1/2-inch space for sealing with fresh paraffin.
