Colon Killen Returns to U. S.

of nothing more than rice and thin soup. But in June of last year I guess they decided they had better adhere to the rules of the Geneva Convention, because they passed around papers which we could sign if we wanted to "volunteer" to work. That after three years of compulsory labor!

No one signed the paper and the work ceased. However, the Japs at once cut down on rations.

At Mukden, where Killen was moved in May of this year, the colonel was able to purchase "quite frank" Japanese newspapers that told of the devastating bombings by the Yanks.

He was captured, he related on May 9, 1942, after Wainright had surrendered.

All communications had been cut," he recalled, "and the Japs couldn't get the surrender order through to our forces in the southern part of the island. They tried leaflets and other means to tell the Yanks to lay down their arms, but to no avail. Finally they put it squarely up to me and I was 'paled' long enough to go with a Japanese officer to the southern Yank forces to convince them that the fight was over—for the time being at least."

On September 6, 1942, the gray-haired, wiry colonel, was moved to Bilbid Prison with other colonels and generals for a short time, then was packed into a dirty freighter bound for the Formosa camp, fittingly called "Starvation camp" by internees.

"There were about 340 of us in the hold of that ship," Killen related, "and it was without portholes or other means of ventilation except for one hatch that was opened only at intervals. There wasn't enough room for all of us to lie down at once. We had to do it in shifts."

Killen, who has been in the army
