

Women's Legal, Economic Status Topic AAUW Meet

The Legal and Economic Status of Women was the subject of two talks given before the Hillsboro Women's group Saturday at McCormick hall. The speaker, Mrs. J. H. Khandke, of the C. T. Richardson of Hillsboro, was introduced to the group by Neil Richardson, recent University of Washington law graduate. In comparing the status of our women with that of those in India, Khandke declared that the sole work of a woman there was to toil at housekeeping, and that because she has no education she knows no other life, she can not fight for any legal or economic rights. He also stated that the average income of a person in India was \$8 per year, and that most families grow enough food for their daily bread.

Senator Paul Patterson, in his discussion of the legal and economic status of American women, pointed out that American women have gained many privileges since 1880. Patterson stated that today, generally speaking, the legal status of men and women in this country is equal. He also mentioned that women's public duty to be well informed and to make use of their privilege of voting. Patterson closed his talk by quoting Lincoln's words, "He who molds public opinion is more powerful than all the lawmakers." Mrs. Gertrude Boyd Crane, chairman of the Fellowship committee, announced that the A. A. U. W. members would sell tickets for the forthcoming Pacific university production of "The Man Who Came to Dinner."
