No date has been announced as to when the new products will be made available to the public. The gas range and the frozen food locker may be on the market about the first of the year. No date has been revealed when the automatic

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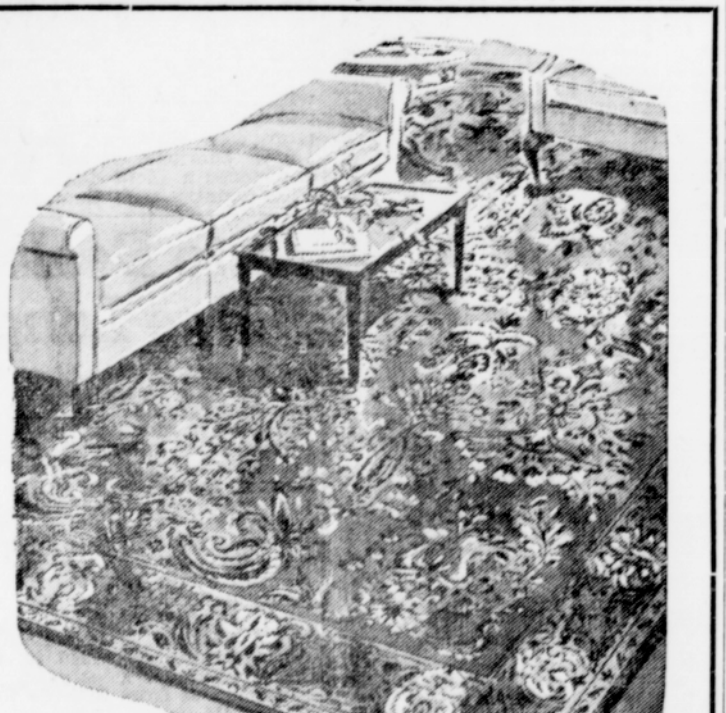
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
