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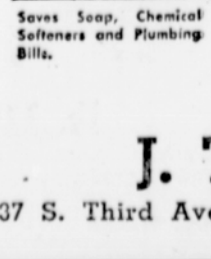
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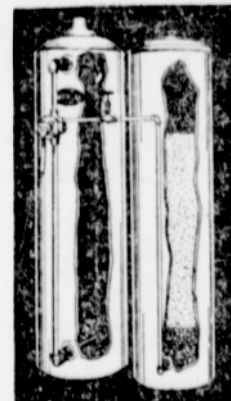
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Reedville PTA Meets Friday; Paper Drive Planned

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Filbert Picker Demonstrated Reedville Yard

REEDVILLE—A large group of county filbert growers were present at the C. J. Stickney filbert orchard last Wednesday for the demonstration of the vacuum filbert picker developed at Oregon State college. The demonstration indicated an improvement in the picker since last year's trial, but it was found to require further improvement before being entirely successful.

The filbert harvest will be completed here this week. Barcelona growers report a fair crop though lighter than that of last year, except in the younger orchards. Recent growers report a bumper crop. Mexicans were employed in the Matheson and Shelles orchards.

Designs Picker
George Croston of Reedville has designed and constructed a mechanical filbert picker which he used as an experiment this season, in his orchard. He found it too slow to be practical as now developed but plans improvements which will eliminate its faults, and expects to have it ready for operation next year.

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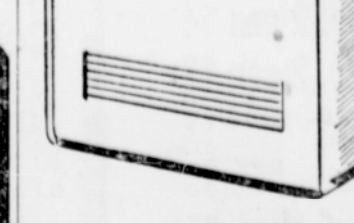
