

Mrs. Dunbar Talks At Annual Banquet Of B.P.W. Club

Mrs. S. Dunbar, executive secretary of the Oregon Tuberculosis Association and past president of the General Federation of Women's Clubs of the nation, was the speaker at the annual banquet of the B.P.W. Club last Friday night. Her subject was "Women in the New Era." She said that woman power is not something you can turn on and off with a switch. It is here—we must utilize it. Women don't want any special privileges because of their sex, but when they do the same work a man does, they want the same pay, the same security from seniority rights that a man can expect.

Women work because it takes two wage earners to support a family of five. Now, more than ever before, women will have to work because of incapacitated husbands returning from battle fronts. Now we must make 60 million jobs—where 40 million are most we ever had.

The government assures every GI his old job. But what was that old job? He may have been behind the fountain at the local drugstore then, and for the past few years he has been saluted as a captain, or a major. He has learned a new skill, and he wants something better—he deserves something better.

During the war, housing regulations have been relaxed enough to set us back on our heels for 25 years or more. We have been fighting for better conditions and now, during the war years, people have been living in human beings should be forced to do.

When Mrs. Dunbar was touring South America as one of a committee of nationally known women, she was told by the presidents of both Chile and Peru that the way to hemispheric solidarity is to have economic stability.

Women should understand the meaning of world events. They should be familiar with the Monroe Doctrine, the Peace Conference policies, and the writings of well known authors.

"We must have one world or we will have no world," Mrs. Dunbar emphasized.

In October, 1941, he became the president of Valparaiso university. He is the author of "The Road Back to God," "Remember," "The Pilgrim," and many other books. He is also co-editor and editor of many magazines.
