Beauty Treatment Advised for Old Coats This Year

This is the year to give that old coat first and of a beauty treatment if it still has wear in it, and then keep it on active duty for another season, says Miss Lucy Lane, extension clothing specialist at Oregon State college. The war is over, but the clothing shortage is not. Here are some suggestions she makes for making the old one do until some real postwar models appear.

Mending a small hole or tear — Ravel yards from a straight inside seam, because repairs with self-thread are most nearly invisible.

Lining repairs — If worn only at neck, sleeves, and hem, consider repair of a lining with matching fabric. Apply a shaped facing about two inches wide at the back of the neck and a two or three inch band at cuff and hem. Catchstitch to the old lining for a decorative effect.

If a lining is worn at underarm, shirtdo, or double duty. They take the rub and serve as patches to hold a frayed lining in place.

A whole new lining — If the old lining must be ripped out, take care not to stretch or tear it, because the pieces when pressed will serve as the pattern. Attach the new lining loosely, as in a new coat, so as not to draw up the coat.

Better buttonholes — If buttonholes are slightly raveled, fasten off thread to stop raveling, and rework with buttonhole or blanket stitch around hole close to edge, then rework. Renewed buttonholes may call for bigger buttons. Some of the new coats have large decorative buttons.

Remodeled collar and cuffs — The worn edge problem can sometimes be solved by cutting down collar and cuffs to smaller shape. Or, make new reverses on collar and cuffs of Velveteen, velvet, or fur may give the coat a new and different air.

Pressing — To give a repaired coat a finished look, steam press wool fabric. Protect it with one of the treated press cloths which can be bought with directions for use, or by covering the coat with a dampened cloth, then a dampened cotton cloth. To steam press, set down, then lift the warm iron with just enough force to drive steam through the cloth, and after pressing lift the cloth and beat the fabric by hand or with a wood block to drive out steam. Be sure that the lining lies smooth under the coat.

HELP ON THE WAY— Their homes wrecked in the path of war and with little or no possessions, civilian war victims are aided by member agencies of the National War Fund in 125 counties and geographic areas throughout the world.

Education is "vastly under-financed in comparison to the results that were produced" during the last few decades, the speaker said. The national average spent per child per day for education has been about fifty cents, he said. "We have learned that we pay dearly in time of national emergency for our meager support of education during peacetime," he added.

Education, not unlike those in other professions, have gained, and will gain in the future, only what is endorsed and supported by the mass movements, Dr. Flora stated.

Lynn Gubser, Yamhill county school superintendent, presided over the morning session of the institute which was attended by both elementary and high school teachers from Columbia, Washington, and Yamhill counties.

Dr. Rex Putnam, superintendent of public instruction for the state, and Dr. Frank Parr, executive secretary of the Oregon Teachers' association, addressed the morning session of the session. Dr. Lawrence Bee, assistant professor of sociology at Reed College, Portland, spoke on "The Challenge of the Present Crisis in American Family Living" at the afternoon session which was presided over by County School Superintendent Austin Serafford.

County war boards in Oregon have been advised by R. B. Taylor, chairman of the state war board, that they may continue making recommendations to selective service boards on agricultural registrants. Selective service has requested continued assistance in determining essential to agricultural activities of registrants between the ages of 18 and 26.

Taylor pointed out that up to the present no instructions have been received, and that the Tidyngs amendment to the selective service act still is effective.
