Navy Veteran Ends Four-Year Service

Veteran of nearly four years of service in the South Pacific with the USS "Rockwell" was discharged from the service Friday at Bremerton, Wash. He arrived back in the States from Saigon on October 20.

Hillis, who had served a previous tour in the navy, re-enlisted the day after Pearl Harbor and was sent almost immediately to the South Pacific in the crew of an attack transport. He saw service in the Coral Sea naval battle and the invasions of Guadalcanal and the Aleutian Islands. Later he was transferred to a landing craft, and was part of the assault on the island of Iwo Jima. He was wounded during the Guadalcanal campaign.

Coast Guard Waits Service Discharge

S. Lee Lyle B. Dunsmoor Jr. of Hillsboro, coast guard, arrived in Portland, October 11 as a crew member of the troopship USS Gen. D. E. Aultman with a record number of soldiers from Okinawa. He is now at the coast guard school camp at Quilicura, Wash., waiting to be discharged.

He enlisted in September 1942, took boat training at Port Townsend and Quilicura, and was assigned to beach patrol for a year and a half on the Oregon coast. After going to gunnery school, he was assigned to the newly constructed coast guard cutter "Westwind" which was sold to Russia under lend-lease at Seattle.

First mission after being assigned to the "Aultman" was to France to transport 3100 troops to the South Pacific. Among the troops he met Jim Burns of Hillsboro.

O'Meara Discharged

Ed O'Meara, formerly news editor of the Hillsboro Argus, has been discharged from the army air corps and returned to his position with the Oregon Journal. O'Meara was a second lieutenant in combat intelligence.

HAINAN ISLAND, China.—T. 4 Roland D. Kent, Banks, is a member of the U. S. army recovery team on Hainan Island.

Kent's parents, Mr. and Mrs. O. D. Kent, live on route 1, Banks. A sailor, Eula Kent, is a cadet nurse at the Providence hospital, Portland. Kent graduated from Banks union high school in the class of 1942. He attended Pacific university, Forest Grove, as a member of the class of 1946 studying journalism and mathematics, but did not complete the course.

He received his basic training at Camp Roberts, Cal., and was in ASTP at the University of Illinois. Later he went to the radio transmitter repair school at Camp Crowder, Mo.

He arrived in China on June 23, 1943, with the 312nd Signal Service company, and was assigned to the 219th Signal Service battalion in Kunming, where he served as transmitter attendant.

Negotiations May Re-open In Lumber Tiff

Encouraging news about the big northwest lumber strike came on Thursday Wednesday, when E. P. Marsh, regional federal labor conciliation agent, expected to have A. F. of L. lumbermen and operators negotiating by the end of the week.

Marsh termed President Truman's address on his wage-price formula "a clear mandate to get around the conference table." Heartened by Truman's address, the striking lumber workers Wednesday renewed their appeal to operators to negotiate with a view to end the strike. Time of the meeting will be announced later, according to Marsh.

Wage Boosts Urged

Higher wages for labor generally, without increase in prices, were urged Tuesday by President Truman, who declared that peacetime cuts in earnings are a "sure road to wide unemployment" if not corrected.

Truman authorized incentive pay boosts in industries even if their prices go up. He named three classes of workers entitled to wage boosts although prices of goods they produce do rise.

Peace Power Pledged President Truman in a Navy day speech before a million persons in Central Park, New York, Saturday, told the world the highest hope of the American people is the perfecting of a world co-operation to a point where atomic methods of destruction can be effectively outlawed forever.

The president, outlining a 12-point policy, said the atomic bomb does not alter the basic foreign policy of the United States but makes development and application of our policy more urgent than ever before. He said the nation regards possession of the atomic bomb "a sacred trust."

Conferees of the house and senate Saturday compromised a dispute over corporate tax relief and agreed on legislation to give \$3,920,000,000 in individual and business tax cuts next year.

The bill would cut income taxes by \$2,644,000,000 and corporate tax liabilities by \$4,136,000,000. The bill proposes tax reductions of nearly \$1 million above the limit suggested by the administration.

Red Troops Strike Communist troops Monday were

reported to have cut 100 miles of the great Peiping-Hankow highway — lifeline for government forces — in northern China. North China's undeclared civil war zone. Government sources admitted the movement of troops was seriously hampered and that because of acute shortages of labor and materials it will take time to get the vital traffic artery functioning again.

The communists struck south of Peiping, cutting rails, blowing up bridges, and destroying stations.

Nippon Gets Edict Message Claimed Delayed Fleet Admiral Osami Nagano — the man who gave the order which sent Jap planes over Pearl Harbor on December 7, 1941, said last week a formal declaration of war was to have preceded the attack by one half hour but was delayed in Tokyo "for some unknown reason."

He said the attack "achieved far greater success than I had expected."

Vargas Resigns Resignation of Getulio Vargas as president of Brazil was announced Tuesday from Rio de Janeiro. Supreme Court Judge Jose Linhares succeeds Vargas. Gen. Pedro Aurelio Goes Monteiro resigned as minister of war but later reconsidered.

Truce in Effect Fighting ceased under a sort of armistice in the big Java naval base city of Soerabaya Tuesday after Indonesian extremists killed 20 British soldiers and wounded 59 others, according to a release from Batavia.

Discharge Speed Ordered General MacArthur last week ordered speeding up discharge of high post men now serving in the Japanese home islands. It was directed that all enlisted men and officers below the rank of brigadier general who were eligible for release September 2 be sent to the nearest distribution center immediately.

Vote Favors Strike Employees of Allied Motors corporation plants throughout the nation last week voted 70,853 to 12,437 in favor of a strike to support the demand of their union for a 30 per cent wage rate increase.

Figures were announced by the regional National Labor Relations board in Detroit and bore out earlier predictions of both the corporation and United Automobile Workers (CIO) that a strike would be favored.

Rate Change Asked Two utilities, Portland General Electric company and the Northwestern Electric company, proposed new rates for electric power and water heater users which will save them about \$500,000 a year, in applications Tuesday to George Elia, state public utilities commissioner at Salem.

Refinery Planned Purchase of the 28-acre tract comprising the Guide Lake federal housing project by Standard Oil Company of California was announced Tuesday by E. V. Burns, manager of the company's Portland district.

This tract, plus 10 adjoining acres previously owned by the company, will be site of a \$1 million asphalt refinery.
