

Spartan Grid Eleven Overpowers West Linn Here Friday, 27 to 13

Sparked by speedy Jack Doyle, all-league halfback, Hillsboro high school Spartans gridmen overpowered West Linn in a Tualatin-Yamhill Valley league game here Friday night, 27 to 13.

The triumph knocked Coach John Paul Brown's Lions out of championship contention and left the Spartans in a second-place tie with Beaverton, just one game out of first place.

Late runs on slants off tackle featured the game which was played with a fog of varying density sweeping across the field.

Halfback Jack Doyle added his fourth and fifteenth touchdowns of the season against the Lions and ripped off the West Linn tackles for a series of big gains aided by good blocking by his teammates. Big star for West Linn was Fullback Ronald Baird who scored both touchdowns for the invaders and tore off big gains through the Hillsboro line.

Hilli took the opening kick-off on its own 40 yard line after an out-of-bounds kick and scored without losing possession of the ball. The touchdown came after two and a half minutes of play after the Spartans had chafed on a pair of first downs on four scrimmage plays.

Willie Laird faded and passed a long one close to the right sideline near the 15 yard line to Doyle, who gathered it in past the Lion secondary and romped to the goal line. Ron Haworth converted on a line plunge.

West Linn drove back to tie the score early in the second quarter when Fullback Ronald Baird culminated a drive from the Lion 46 by blashing to pay dirt from the 30-yard line. Jay McMurran passed

to Don Smith for the extra point making the score 7 to 7.

Doyle scored late in the first half on a 10-yard sweep over the left side of his own line but the play was nullified on a 15-yard penalty plays later, with the ball on the 12-yard line, Laird heaved a touchdown pass to Right End Dave Ehler in the end zone. Haworth converted on a line plunge. Halftime score: Hillsboro 14, West Linn 7.

Doyle added Hilli's third touchdown midway in the third period after the Spartans had driven to their own 38 on four plays from the four yard line. He found a hole over his own left secondary and sprinted down the right side 62 yards to a touchdown. Haworth again converted on a line buck to make the score 21 to 7.

Last Spartan touchdown came soon after the last quarter opened. Haworth paved the way by intercepting a Lion pass on his own 18 yard line. With Laird, Haworth, and Doyle taking turns at carrying the ball, Hillsboro drove to the visitors' 21 yard line on five consecutive first downs.

Laird then took the ball on third down with one yard to go and churned through a hole in the middle of the line for the touchdown. The try for point failed.

Doyle scored the game's last touchdown on a plunge from the one yard line following a drive from the West Linn 32. An attempted line buck for extra point failed. Final score: Hillsboro 27, West Linn 13.

The Hilli band, led by five majorettes, serenaded between halves.

Farrell Issues Traffic Warning

With snow, ice and hazardous traffic conditions just around the corner, it is now vital for motorists who would drive this winter to take the time to check their cars in the safest possible conditions, according to Robert S. Farrell, secretary of state.

"This is more important this year than ever before, because traffic engineers and safety experts say that this will be the worst auto accident winter in history," Farrell added. "Your life may depend on how well your vehicle's safety equipment works—or on how well the other fellow's works."

The reason for the prediction that this winter may set a new high in traffic accidents, he pointed out, is that the ending of gasoline rationing will mean more cars on the road, most of them about eight years old, and more miles to be traveled per car during the dangerous snow and ice months.

In addition, motorists accustomed during the war to a compulsory 35 mile an hour speed limit, may have become careless and prone to misjudge the distance within which they can stop their cars traveling at high speeds, particularly on slippery pavements. Not only that, he said, but motorists have grown increasingly weary of war-born restraints, and now that freedom is lifted are inclined, perhaps, to take more chances, just by way of celebration.

Even so, winter is also the peak season for accidents. Studies of previous years show that in winter, traffic accident death rates increase from 21 to 33 per cent in 36 snow-belt states.

"This is due in part to inadequate traction on slippery pavements, and to reduced visibility, both because of weather conditions and because there are more hours of darkness in winter than in summer."

He called upon all truck fleet operators and individual car owners to take immediate steps to put their cars in the safest possible condition for winter. This, he said, should include checking of brakes, tire chains, windshield wipers, defrosters, headlights, electrical and cooling systems and the exhaust.

"A motorist whose car is in shape has the safety battle half won," he said.

Motorists themselves, he said, can help reduce accidents by keeping their cars under control at all times, exercising particular care when pavements are slippery with ice or covered with snow. Use of anti-skid chains in slippery weather, he said, permits a motorist to stop his car in half the distance that would otherwise be required, and good defrosters and lights provide visibility. The main causes of winter accidents, research shows, are added hazards of skidding and impaired visibility.

Drive Soon for Pacific Funds

The annual drive to raise funds for Pacific university at Forest Grove will be expanded to include all of Washington county this year, according to Chairman Ray Miller. W. C. Christensen of Hillsboro is to have charge of the campaign in the Hillsboro area. It was announced that it is expected that the campaign will start around December 1. Persons will be able to designate their gifts to any project in year. Contributions in the past have gone mainly to current expense.
