Navy Releases Six County Men

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Norman Smith Gets Army Discharge

Churchill Says Atomic Secrecy Sacred Trust

WINSTON Churchill expressed hope in the house of commons Wednesday that Britain would not bring pressure on the United States to reveal all the atom bomb secrets to Russia. Churchill said he hoped that we shall adhere to the policy declared by President Truman to keep the knowledge and processes as a sacred trust—as a deterrent to aggressive war.

Russian Foreign Commissar Molotov expressed Soviet disapproval of secrecy on atomic energy in a Moscow address Tuesday and declared the war discovery must not be used either for appeasement or for aggressive war.

Gen. Eisenhower in a grave report told Washington that there is danger of an atomic war in Germany, which was just one step from organized resistance.
