

Larceny Cases Reported to County Sheriff

Several county larceny cases were reported to Sheriff John W. Connelley during the past week. Vernon Kraus, manager of Tualatin Co-op, reported that the building at 449 S. Second avenue was broken into Saturday night and property valued at more than \$100 stolen. Included in the loot were a power hair battery and platter toaster, coat hanger, truck tester, and cash. Mrs. B. C. Johnson of Tobias reported loss of jewelry, clothing, and 19 pieces of sterling silver, taken some time last week while she was away visiting.

R. L. Price, route 2, Newberg, reported that a new Indian blanket was taken from his automobile while it was parked in front of Roemer's Rest tavern October 23. In a jury verdict rendered October 31 in circuit court of Judge R. Frank Peters, cause was found for the plaintiff in the case of Frank S. 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CAPITAL PARADE

About half of the elected state officers located at the capital were in Portland Friday and Saturday attending the annual state convention of Oregon Republican clubs. The federal government has encroached too far on the rights of the states of the Union, and the people of the United States are facing the dangers of military rule. These were the signal warnings made by Governor John C. Vivian of Colorado, who gave the keynote address. Leslie M. Scott, state treasurer, gave Saturday's luncheon speech on "Selling Souls to Satan." Judge Joseph H. Felton was elected president of OGRAs for the next year. New Blue Book
The first copies of the state's official directory, the Oregon Blue Book, were released this week by Secretary of State Robert S. Farrer Jr. and will be sold for 25 cents a copy. There were 30,000 copies issued this year as compared with 17,000 two years ago. The increase was made possible by the use of the new printing process. The book is published every two years.

A Study in Technique
The legislatures of the states of Washington, Oregon and California will be asked to adopt legislation on off-shore fishing and memorialize congress to secure national and international pacts that will settle off-shore fishing rights along the Pacific coast that are necessary to save depletion of the industry. State Senator Walter Pearson, chairman of the interstate co-operation committee's sub-committee on fishing, said effort would be made first to reach an agreement with Washington and California. The sub-committee at a meeting this week at Salem recommended that Pacific coast states be given extended jurisdiction over off-shore fisheries beyond the three-mile limit. The Oregon group also will seek legislation pertaining to the razor clam industry which is said to be depleting rapidly.

Employees Classified
State employees, subject to the new state civil service law enacted by the 1945 Oregon legislature, will be classified immediately. State Civil Service Commissioner J. N. Chapman announced this week. Classification of the 6,000 employees will be based on job duties and responsibilities.

Marine Corps Anniversary
In a grand salute November 6, Governor Earl Snell called attention to the observance of the 17th anniversary of the establishment of the United States Marine Corps, on Saturday, November 10. "The Marines have a long and glorious history in which every citizen of the country may take pride. They have forever been in the vanguard of the United States' fighting forces, and the record they have made in World War II is second to none in the world," he said.

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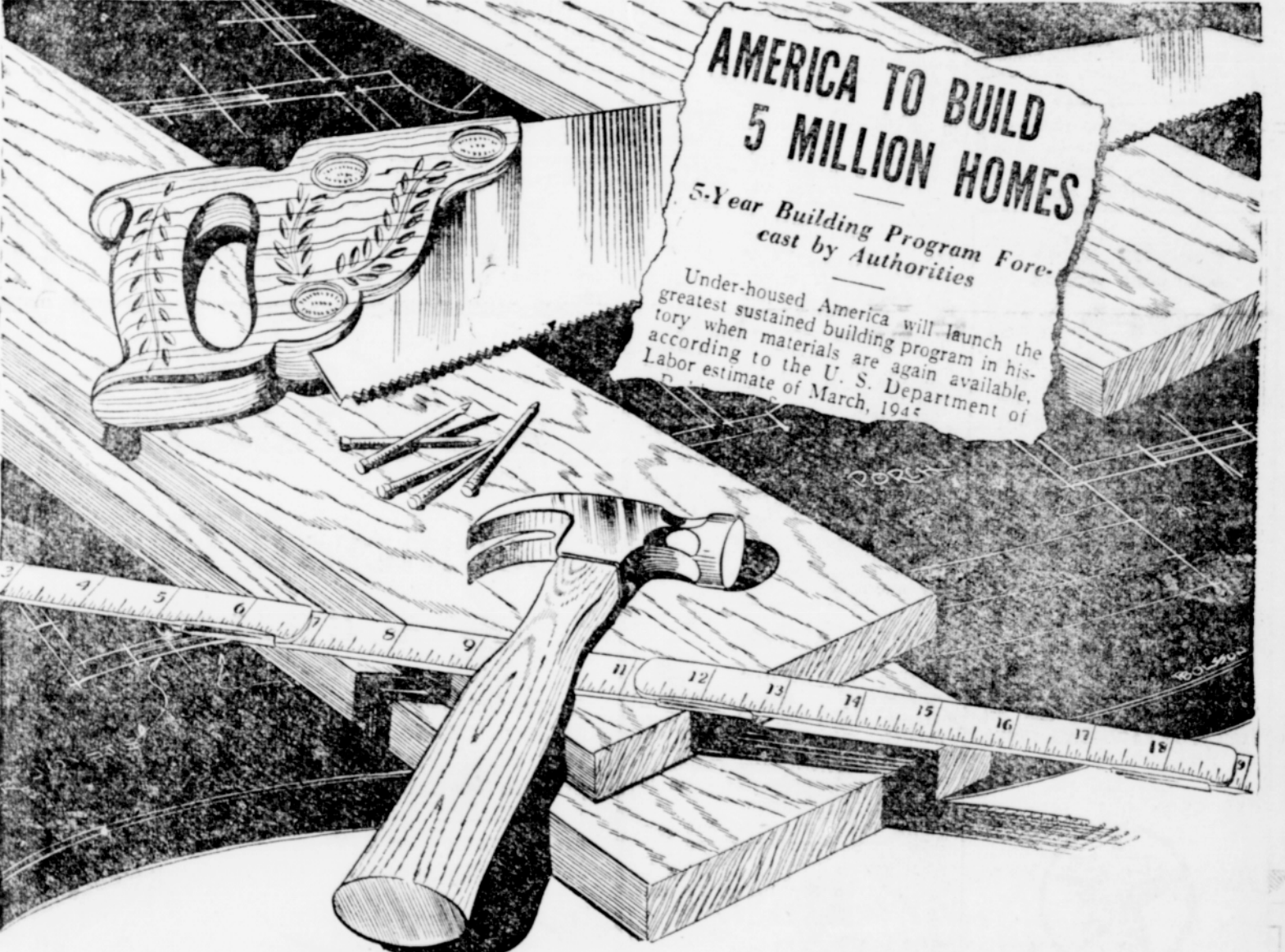
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
