Prisoner of Japs To Speak Sunday

Mrs. Anell Nance, wife of Rev. Anell Nance of Hong Kong, will speak Sunday night at the Baptist Gospel chapel upon her experiences with her husband and four children in the Stanley Concentration camp in Hong Kong at the hands of the brutal Japanese.

Mrs. Nance is the daughter of Rev. and Mrs. T. W. Kennington of Portland, who themselves were missionaries to China for 20 years. In fact, Mrs. Nance was born in China.

She was also the classmate of Rev. W. T. Mugford, pastor of the local gospel chapel, at the Western Baptist Theological seminary in Portland and he has heard her remark, "I was born in China and I owe a debt to China and that is to preach the gospel there."

The pastor and Mrs. Mugford attended the farewell service of Rev. and Mrs. Nance about six years ago when they left for China. The members of the local chapel congregation have prayed much for their liberation from the cruel concentration camp.

The Portland newspapers have carried much publicity of the Nances during their captivity and deliverance and the moment official word was wired to the parents from Washington, D. C. Rev. Mugford was the first friend of the family to be notified.

Mrs. Nance has suffered much from malnutrition but has gained 10 pounds since her liberation and return to America. Her husband continued to remain in China and continue on the work feeling he was needed there more so now, that the war is ended, and she intends to return as soon as possible to China to rejoin her husband in missionary work.

Two of her children were born in the Jap prison and are having difficulty becoming accustomed to good, wholesome American food after living on Jap fare. In 1942 Rev. and Mrs. Nance were given a chance to return to America aboard the Grisholm, but stayed to work among the suffering and the tortured in the prison.

Methodist Sunday school board met Monday evening at the home of Rev. Fred Ray.

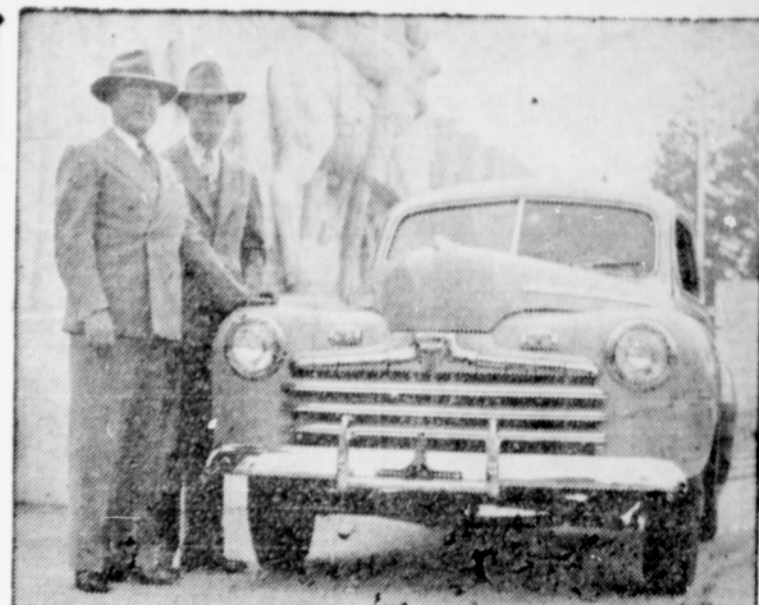

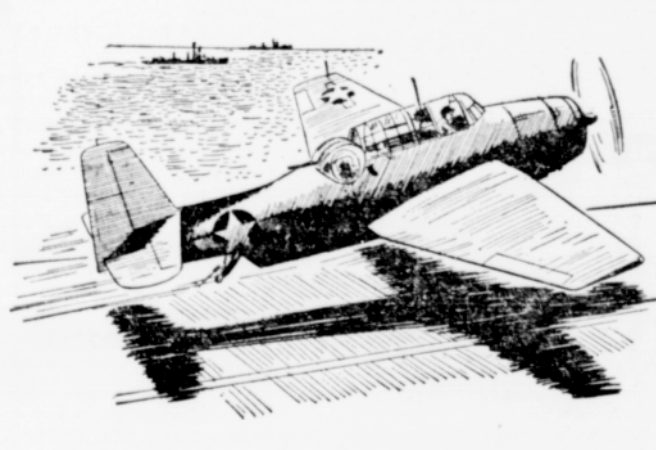
