

## Graham Motors Opens Saturday In New Building

Hillsboro's newest motor firm, to be known as Dean Graham Motors, opens Saturday, November 24, in a new 70 by 100 foot concrete building at First and Washington streets. The building is owned by Henry Melbeck and Adolph Mohr is contractor.

The new firm will handle DeSoto and Plymouth automobiles and announces it hopes to have new models for display before the first of the year. Plymouth models have already been shipped and early showing is expected. The firm's show room incorporates the latest in styling and is designed to accommodate a display of six cars.

Dean Graham formerly operated a large service station in Portland at Broadway and Burnside and is experienced in the automobile field. He has been with the U. S. maritime commission as an auditor since selling the Portland business.

J. R. Hayes, service manager, was a first lieutenant in the air forces and was in service for nearly five years. He was with the 14th air force at Chungking and was awarded the purple heart for wounds suffered in action. Hayes announced that veterans and local persons are being favored for employment.

The service department will be in operation immediately for general service and mechanical maintenance. It was announced. The firm plans to operate a modern service station, handling Standard Chevrolet products.

It was announced that delay in opening can be attributed to difficulty in securing equipment from the east, some of which has not arrived as yet.

An additional building will be constructed on a lot to the east of the present structure to house a modern paint and body shop.

U. S. Marines, who observe the 170th anniversary of the founding of their Corps November 10, have returned to China after an absence of nearly four years. Withdrawn from China in November, 1941, to join other U. S. forces in the defense of the Philippines, America's Soldiers of the Sea observed wartime anniversaries in actions against a stubborn and fanatical foe at Guadalcanal, Bougainville and Peleliu. ## Trial of Nazis Begins; Health Program Asked

Trial of top flight nazis started at Nuremberg, Germany, Wednesday. They are accused of the murder of 10 million Europeans, plunder, horror and torture.

The late Navy Secretary Frank Knox predicted January 24, 1941, that if war with Japan occurred, hostilities might begin with a surprise attack upon the Pacific fleet.

The compulsory insurance program, which the White House said is not socialized medicine, would call for prepayment of costs through premiums adjusted to meet the income of the people generally.

Keep Atom Bomb Secret  
President Truman and the prime ministers of Great Britain and Canada concluded their atomic bomb control talks Friday with an announcement that the mechanical know-how of bomb production will continue to be kept secret. They recommended the establishment of a commission under the United Nations organization to work toward "entirely eliminating the use of atomic energy for destructive purposes."

Strong Army Good Insurance  
General Eisenhower testifying before house military affairs committee declared Friday that this country's military power is the "greatest single motivating force for world peace."

Gen. Eisenhower said that Russia is eager to remain at peace with this country and predicted there never will be a war between the U. S. and Great Britain.

Admiral Nimitz Saturday urged congress to settle its proposal to merge the army and navy, on the ground it would endanger American command of the sea.

Congressional investigation reveals that Japanese first conceived Pearl Harbor attack in January, 1941.

Exhibits placed before congressional committee investigating Pearl Harbor revealed that the U. S. government was translating Japan's coded messages months before Pearl Harbor, knew she was spying on Hawaiian, Philippine and other defenses, and knew — well before the December, 1941, raid on

United Auto Workers (C.I.O.) Thursday rejected a general ten per cent wage increase offered by General Motors as a compromise of the union's demand for a 30 per cent boost.
