Mr. Lewis is moving to Portland. He managed the Tulip for approximately one year. Parshall has been

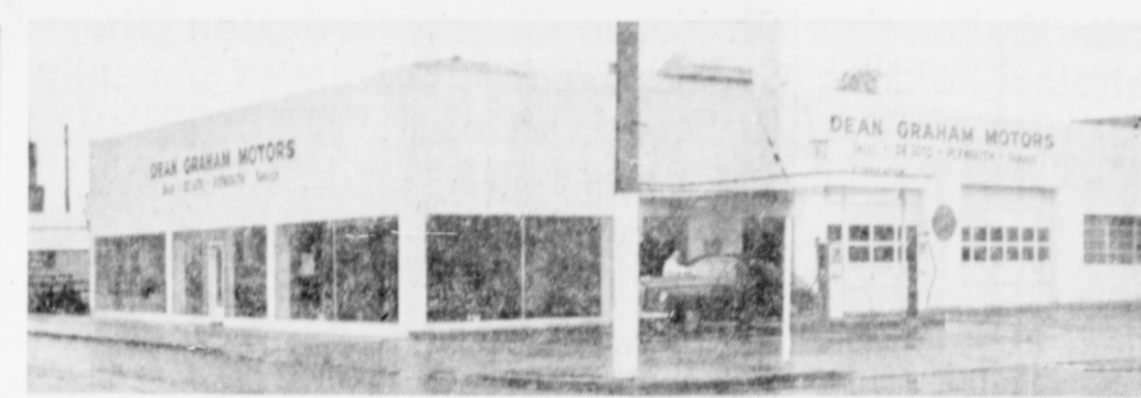
Claim Service Due At Forest Grove

Water System Election Friday

served by the system completely without water for short periods of time, it was pointed out. Age of the pipeline was blamed for these failures.

Present plans call for installation of an 18-inch metal pipeline from the city of Hillsboro to a point on the Tualatin river above Lee falls, together with a diversion dam, access road from Cherry Grove to the diversion dam, and a 5 million gallon storage reservoir at the location of the reservoir near Dilley.

Time Estimated
An estimated nine to ten months will be required for construction after delivery of materials has started. Because of the critical condition of the present pipeline, officials are hoping to have the project completed in 1945. J. W. Barney, engineer and manager of the system, states that actual laying of the pipe should start by April, 1946.

The proposed system will produce 3½ million gallons a day, nearly double the present forced-gallage. Reduction in maintenance and operation costs of the new system will amount to an estimated \$12,000 a year, a sum expected to meet interest charges on a \$600,000 bond issue. Bond retirement schedule from plant revenues call for the payment of \$30,000 a year for the first ten years and \$35,000 annually for the second ten years.

Titles Listed

Ballot titles will read as follows: Charter amendment submitted to the voters by the city council. Purpose: Shall section 66 of the amended charter of the city of Hillsboro be amended by granting the power to the city council to reconstruct, repair, extend, and improve its water system or electric system, and to issue bonds therefor, payable from the net revenues of the system and, if insufficient, then, at the council's discretion from general taxes said bonds may be issued without an election other than the right of referendum, and which bonds will not be part of the debt limitation fixed by the charter, and by delegating therefrom the clause as to franchises now expired.

Proposition on bonds submitted to the voters by the city council. Shall the City of Hillsboro issue \$600,000 water bonds payable, first, from revenues of the water system and secured, secondarily, by general taxation should the revenues be insufficient, with which to secure funds to reconstruct and extend its water system?

Section 66 of the charter now gives the council the right to construct, or purchase, and operate and maintain water and electric systems, but does not provide for reconstruction, repair, extend and improve such systems.

Accent on Unanimity

An intensely active but harmonious conference of governors of 11 western states held at Cheyenne, Wyo., last week ended Wednesday night after 36 hours of serious work, largely on problems of the states as a region. Resolutions were adopted urging federal agencies to release materials to relieve housing shortages, and set up a committee to study the problem of federal land ownership in western states, and urging immediate sale or lease of government-owned aluminum and steel plants, and to advertise the states with unified programs.

The conference was too busy for a political field-day with party lines and elected Governor Mon C. Wolfgram, Washington democrat, chairman of the session. He returned to Salem in time to meet Lt. General Wainwright, "the hero of Bataan and Corregidor," who was the house guest of Secretary of State Robert S. Farrel Jr. Friday night.

More Candidates
The campaign of the special election will be short, snappy and democratic. New names proposed as candidates for congress include that of Representative Anna M. Ellis of Tillamook whose backers reckon she would get enough feminine names to win.

Senator W. E. Burke, Yamhill veteran of 11 regular and special sessions of the legislature, is being urged to run by the following he made as author of the "Burke line bill." Representative Manley J. Wilson, Clatsop, editor of CIO weekly Woodworker, is scheduled to run.

Workers and Wages
The average wage of Oregon workers last year was about 27 per cent higher than in 1942 and hit an all-time high of \$251, according to a recent survey made by the state industrial accident commission. This was three times the amount paid workers in any year previous to 1941. The average wage paid persons working throughout the year 1943 was \$297 as compared with \$1832 in 1942. The top average was made by shipyard workers with \$2438. All figures include overtime.

Payrolls of firms subject to the state industrial accident commission reached almost \$900,000 last year. In October this year there was a drop of almost \$1,000,000 from the preceding month, and down nearly \$800,000 from October a year ago.

Alumina Plant Fertilizer
From 250 to 500 tons of fertilizer will be made at the Seaboard Alumina plant for distribution to retailers who have agreed to sell at a limited margin of \$2 a ton if sale is made directly from car or truck and \$4 if passed through the dealer's warehouse. Arrangements were made in Washington by the OSC extension service.

Artesian Well on B. W. Gent Farm Shows High Yield

An artesian well on the B. W. Gent farm on Hillsboro road six miles northwest of Forest Grove is now yielding 300 gallons of water an hour with a pressure of 25 pounds. The well provides enough natural pressure for a water system to the house and barn.

The well is 343 feet deep and was drilled by A. J. Gaunt of Aloha in June. The water, which is clear and pure, was found in a sandstone formation.
