Christmas Sweets Made With Sugar Stretchers

Christmas traditions of home-made sweets will be observed in spite of sugar shortages by the use of syrups, honey, dried fruits, and other sugar extenders, says Lucy A. Case, extension nutritionist at O. S. C.

A variation of old-fashioned sugarless molasses taffy combines with mint in a delicious product. A new method of combining dried fruits, chopped nuts and honey or syrup produces a delectable variety of Parisian sweets.

Excellent crackjack for the youngsters or oldsters can be made with molasses and a small amount of brown sugar.

Recipes for these sugar saving sweets, including a new marshmallow made with fruit, are given in a new circular HE 1927, "Sugar Saving Christmas Sweets," which is available free at all extension service offices.

Aloha-Huber Water System Bids Asked

Bid call on a project for the Aloha-Huber water district near Beaverton was issued Monday by Civil Engineer C. E. Carter of the Portland area. The project will involve approximately 300 connections in Huber and Aloha and intervening territory.

Voters in the district have approved issuance of \$215,000 in bonds for the project, including engineering fees, under present plans wooden pipe and extensions in the system will be replaced with 103,000 lineal feet of four-inch, six-inch, eight-inch and ten-inch O. D. steel pipe and 84,000 lineal feet of two-inch and 2½-inch galvanized iron pipe with gate valves and fittings.

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Nation Saves on Salvage Program

The army's intensive salvage program has resulted in heavy savings to the government in money and vital materials, it was indicated in a recent report on salvage activities at Portland port of embarkation.

Since April 1, 1945, alone, the last period covered in the report of the salvage office, the amount of salvage materials reclaimed includes: Cooking grease, 960 pounds; waste paper, 24,740 pounds; trap grease, 1149 pounds; cardboard, 16,444 pounds; glass, 1315 pounds; firewood in three-fourth cords, 625 units; boardfoot of lumber, 1,330,776 feet; tin, 6302 pounds; scrap iron, 360,386 pounds.

A million dollars worth of lumber was reclaimed in July, August, and September last year during the peak of activities from used stocks, it was revealed.
