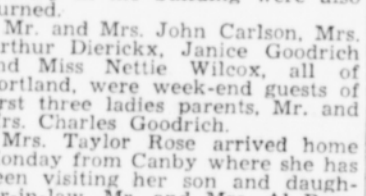
Joe Frydendall is having the ground leveled and filled in west of the Dingelzer, going ready to build a service station in the near future.
