

People Asked to Help in Plane Search, Rescue

SAN FRANCISCO — The residents of every farm, village, town and city in California, Washington, Oregon, Nevada and Idaho are being asked to assist in a new search and rescue program of the Fourth Air Force which has been organized to find the lives of flying personnel who crash or parachute from their planes. Maj. Gen. Willis H. Hale, Commanding General, Fourth Air Force, has announced.

If you see a plane crash, call the police, sheriff or state highway patrol immediately giving them the details of the incident, the location and your name and address. They will forward the information to the proper army or navy authorities.

Residents of these five western states can also help in locating missing planes. Currently a wide-spread search is continuing in the Fourth Air Force area for two B-24 heavy bombers missing since November 1. On that date four of the huge four-motored aircraft took off from McChord Field, Wash., en route to Portland, 1,100 miles. One of the planes landed at Arcata, Cal., and a second at Redmond, Oregon. Nothing has since been seen or heard of the other two planes.

If you have any clue as to the whereabouts of these planes for forward your information to the nearest law enforcement agency who will send it on to the Fourth Air Force search and rescue organization, the 475th AAF Base Unit.

The 475th has its headquarters in San Francisco with the Fourth Air Force and controls search and rescue activities throughout the five western states and coordinates searches with the navy, marine and coast guard units. The organization is under the command of Col. Alfred V. Walton.

Since the Fourth Air Force emergency rescue program was first established in September, 1944, 931 persons have been rescued. Many of these were due to tips and telephone calls from residents on outlying farms and small towns.

State Bulletin Discusses Ore

Oregon's large reserves of ferruginous bauxite ore, which some day may become an important source of alumina to feed aluminum plants of the northwest, are described in a bulletin just issued by the state department of geology and mineral industries.

The bulletin points out that since the discovery of a high iron bauxite in Washington county about 35 miles northwest of Portland additional field work has extended the known occurrences into other counties and revealed an entirely new bauxite area near Salem.

Considerable interest in the aluminum-bearing deposits has been shown by some of the large industrial companies, and Alcoa Mining company, a subsidiary of the Aluminum Company of America, is at present engaged in a large-scale drilling and exploration project on these deposits in Washington and Columbia counties.

F. W. Libbey, W. D. Lowry, and R. S. Mason of the state department are authors of the 97-page publication, which discusses the geology and economics of the deposits and describes the 94 localities where bauxite has been found.

Newsprint Ceiling Prices Given Boost

An increase of \$6 a ton on newsprint ceiling prices was announced last week by Office of Price Administration. While the increase becomes effective December 11, OPA said the industry generally would not apply it until January 1, since most newsprint is sold on a yearly contract basis, with quarterly adjustments.

Purpose of the increase, OPA said, is to assure prices that are "generally fair and equitable." It also is expected to "operate to check further decreases in United States newsprint production, which has been gradually declining for some years."
