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Junior Red Cross Enrollment 4820

County Junior Red Cross enrollment has reached a total of 4820 with 192 elementary rooms from 60 public schools signed up. It was announced from headquarters in Hillsboro Tuesday.

Three high schools, Hillsboro, Forest Grove, and Beaverton have enrolled a total of 1775 students. Enrollment fee is 50 cents per room for elementary schools and \$1 for each 100 students in high schools.
