County Represented

Building Total Drops Slightly During November

Building permits for construction estimated at \$17,000 were issued in Hillsboro during November, according to City Recorder Ed M. Bowman. Total for the 12 permits was \$730 less than for 11 October.

Largest estimated project on the list of November permits was \$3,000. This was granted E. J. McAlair for addition to the rear of the Hillsboro Aragus building. Construction will be of concrete tile with a composition roof.

E. M. Stiles was granted a permit to construct a \$3,500 store and cafe building on West Baseline street. Construction has already been started and will be finished in a couple of months.

Third largest permit was to John R. Briot for construction of a \$2,000 residence on West Main street. Another permit was granted for an addition to the building at 256 S. Second avenue owned by J. O. Robb. An office of concrete block and cement construction, estimated at \$1,500, is being built by Victor Batchelor, contractor.

Addition Planned By Jones Hospital

A new 40x106-foot annex, large enough to accommodate 36 beds, and equipped with two new surgical suites, will be constructed on the north side of Jones hospital in Hillsboro as soon as materials are available. It was announced this week by Mr. and Mrs. Sam Coy (Minnie Jones), proprietors.

Jack Annand of Tigard is architect for the project and Adolph Mohr, contractor. Construction will be consistent with the present building, which holds 37 beds and 18 baby cribs and is to be used mostly as maternity wards.

Jones hospital is registered and recognized by the American Medical association and at present handles patients for eight physicians.

The automobile was stolen in Portland but is owned by Joseph Wendling, who lives on route 3, Beaverton. Eastman was riding his bicycle along the extreme north side of Highway 100, accompanied by Glenn Grant, 10, also of Witch Hazel. Grant said Eastman was carrying a lighted candle.

Eastman suffered a crushed head and was dead when the ambulance arrived. The case was investigated by the county coroner. The death car had a damaged headlight, radiator, and hood, and the windshield was shattered. A piece of the windshield with part of the 1945 sticker was found with the body.

Officer Boyer reported that the westbound automobile was traveling an estimated 60 miles an hour through rain. The accident occurred at shortly before 7 p. m.

Funeral services for Mr. Reed were held Tuesday afternoon at DeLeon & Sewell chapel in Hillsboro, with interment at Fir Lawn cemetery.

Reed was born in Illinois on November 4, 1877, and had been a resident of Beaverton vicinity for 38 years. He was secretary and treasurer of Farm Loan organizations in Illinois and Missouri for a period of 19 years and was pastor of a Methodist Episcopal church in Illinois for four years.

He graduated from Effingham and Dixon colleges and University of Illinois and was editor of several publications. He founded Red Pole Stock Journal. He at one time compiled a history of Washington county for the state.

Surviving are his wife, Bessie F. of route 3; one daughter, Mrs. Helen Sulser of Oregon City, and one grandchild.

Funeral services for Eastman were held Saturday afternoon at DeLeon & Sewell chapel with burial at Fir Lawn cemetery. The lad was born at Orenco, June 11, 1931. He is survived by his parents, and sister, Peggy.

Local Utilities Still Recovering From Wind Storm

Local utilities are still suffering a hang-over from last week's heavy wind storm which wrecked havoc with roofs, trees, poles, and telephone and power lines. Phone and electrical service has been restored in most parts of the county but in some places only on a temporary basis.

Portland General Electric answered between 500 and 600 trouble calls during the past week, according to Art Gilmore, service superintendent, and every feeder in the county was affected. He said approximately 30 linemen, groundmen, and other employees worked all the first night, some men staying on the job for 30 to 35 consecutive hours. PG&E crews worked all night the rest of the week.

W. S. Everett of West Coast telephone company reported that a cable splicing crew worked for three days near the corner of Sixth and E. Main where a falling tree pulled the telephone carrier down. Everett said it was the greatest amount of wind damage to phone lines he has seen in approximately 35 years of work in this area.

No deaths or serious injuries were reported locally as resulting from the storm although seven cows were lost because the Tualatin Valley Cow and Horse exchange barn, 4301 S. W. Scholls road, collapsed during the blow. Two of the animals were killed by falling timbers, according to Alfred Greenbaum and Leo Goldsmith, proprietors.

The rest were rescued by neighbors and members of the Beaverton fire department, but five were badly injured. They had to be destroyed. It was also reported that half of an estimated 100 tons of hay in the barn was ruined.
