Lt. Melvin J. C. Rehse of Hillsboro received his navy discharge at Seattle on December 14, according to a release from the 13th naval district headquarters.

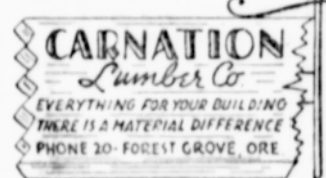

Sgt. Albert Reidweg Serving in Japan

WITH THE 7TH INFANTRY DIVISION, Hokkaido, Japan—Sgt. Albert C. Reidweg, route 2, Cornelius, Ore., who landed with the first occupation forces on Hokkaido, has been serving occupational duty in the Murocan sector.

Sgt. Reidweg became a member of the "Clear the Way," 307th infantry regiment of the eighth army's 77th (Status of Liberty) division on Okinawa, May 7, 1945, during the decisive Okinawa campaign. He is a veteran of the battle against the Shuri defense line, which engaged in mopping-up action against Japanese infiltrators and enemy defense pockets.

Reidweg served as a radio operator during action on Okinawa and since coming to Hokkaido he has been promoted to communications sergeant.

He is authorized to wear the Combat Infantry badge, the Asiatic-Pacific theatre ribbon with one battle star, the Good Conduct medal, and the Victory medal.

Sgt. Reidweg is very much in anticipation of returning to the states, after spending nine months overseas.

Before entering the army he worked on his father's farm near Cornelius, Ore.

His parents, Mr. and Mrs. Peter Reidweg, reside near Cornelius.

Overseas Vet Home on Re-enlistment Leave

He is authorized to wear the Asiatic-Pacific theatre ribbon with one battle star, the Good Conduct medal, and the Victory medal.

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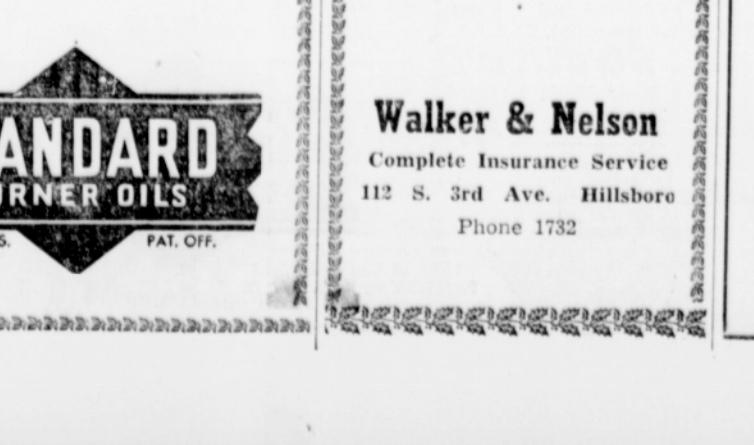
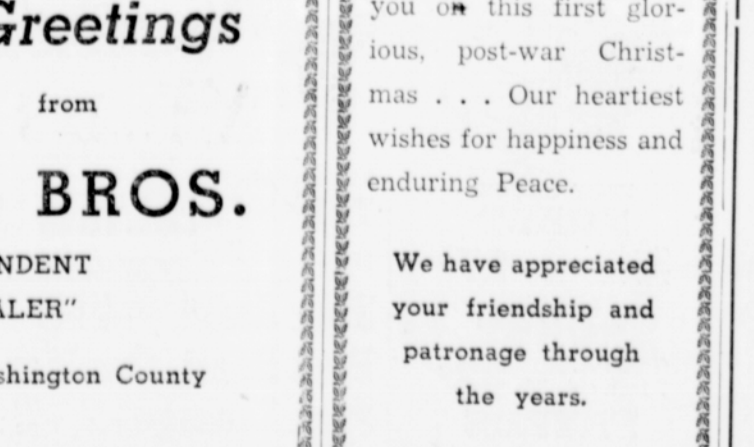
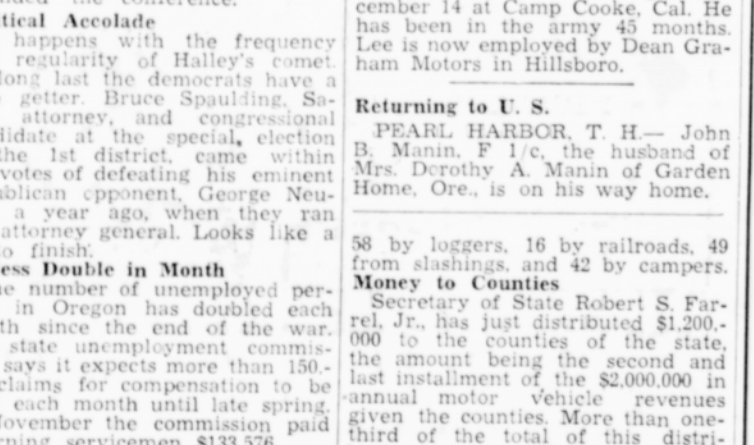

Vitamin Research Planned Soon at Children's Home

Research on vitamin C metabolism at the W. C. T. U. children's home in Corvallis will begin the first of January under the direction of Clara A. Storvick, associate professor of foods and nutrition at Oregon State college. Workers hope to gather data which will lead to more information regarding vitamin C requirements of adolescent children.

Jeanne Quinn, nutrition research assistant, and Bonnie Davey, graduate student, will live at the farm home the entire winter term, carrying out the actual experiments and gathering data. Laboratory equipment from the college will be used in determining chemically the vitamin C content of food the children eat and of the children's blood plasma.

Results of the experiments will represent a small portion of nationwide research on vitamin C requirements in which Oregon State has been taking part for several years.

Employment in Oregon Drops

Oregon's industrial employment dropped 60,000 in the 12 months preceding September, 1945, and third quarter covered payrolls were 15.4 per cent lower than in 1944, according to figures just compiled by the state unemployment compensation commission.

Payrolls for the third quarter were \$171,268,921, bringing the total for the first nine months of 1945 to \$552,082,581, a decrease of 6.6 per cent from the \$590,924,494 reported for the same period last year.

Because of 10 millions higher payroll exemptions on third quarter wages than for the second quarter, unemployment taxes dropped from \$3,621,389 to \$3,094,261, or nearly 15 per cent in three months. A further loss anticipated when contributions are made on reduced fourth quarter payrolls with still higher exemptions.

G. W. Miller Rites Held on Wednesday

George Washington Miller, 77, of Cherry Grove, died December 16 in Hillsboro. The funeral was at Forest Grove Undertaking company chapel and graveside services were conducted in L.O.O.F. cemetery, Hillsboro, Wednesday morning.

Mr. Miller, formerly a logger, had been a resident of Cherry Grove for the past four years and of Oregon for nine years. He was born October 14, 1869. Surviving are one daughter, Mrs. Georgia Miller, and one son, Edgar Miller, both of Cherry Grove; two step-sons, Lionel M. Hurrelbrink of Florence and Milton Hurrelbrink of Lawrence, Kan.; and a brother, Edgar Miller, of Williams; and 14 grandchildren.

Jobless Double in Month

The number of unemployed persons in Oregon has doubled each month since the end of the war. The state unemployment commission says it expects more than 100,000 claims for compensation to be filed each month until late spring. In November the commission paid returning servicemen \$133,576.

Forest Fire Cause

Forest fires in Oregon this year burned over almost twice as many acres as did the fires of the past five years. The principal fire this year was the 133,000-acre Tillamook blaze, which was the major portion of the 166,588 acres burned. Burn-overs for the past five years averaged less than 20,000 acres a year. There were 823 fires of which 325 were caused by lightning, 108 by incendiaries, 134 by smokers.
