Time is growing short to lay the foundations for the production of American Legion junior baseball on a state-wide basis for 1946.

George Bertz, sports editor of the Oregon Journal, has true, and we would like to locate this statement by saying this would be a good time to start the ball rolling in Hillsboro to produce a championship team.

The Oregon City American Legion post at an early December meeting voted to again sponsor a baseball team, and its athletic committee is already planning to put out a top-flight team. Hillsboro might take a hint on that and start laying the groundwork for this season now instead of waiting until spring when baseball fever is already in the air and some valuable time has been lost.

Hillsboro, and surrounding territory, fortunately has some seasoned baseball men who can put a smart, well-trained team on the field. Playing talent exists in this area, too, what with high schools and grade schools turning out teams. All that's needed is an organized push and a season.

The annual Tualatin-Yamhill valley league hoop jamboree at Newberg was a colorful spectacle with the Tizard band on hand and the rooting sections of both teams. It was a great chance for the players and coaches to find out what they'll be up against in the coming weeks.

The jamboree also accomplished another purpose. It proved to the world that the TYZ league, which is already recognized as one of Oregon's toughest prep hoops, is going to provide a lot of thrills and close competition during the months of January and February before a champion is crowned.
