Of the county's 22,243 registered voters, 146 are independents, 13 socialists, 18 prohibitionists, and 430 are listed as miscellaneous. Total registration for the district has been set at 147,383. Of these 81,774 are republicans, 62,580 democrats, 708 independents, 103 socialists, 208 prohibitionists, and 2552 miscellaneous.

Weather Hurts — Small crop losses were experienced in strawberries, due to hot dry weather; prunes, due to rain, brown rot, and chocked receiving stations; beans, due to pods maturing faster than harvest operations; walnuts, due to heavy rains and reluctance of Mexican nationals to work in bad weather.

The most serious problem encountered by the farm labor office was the lack of suitable housing and transportation facilities by farmers. Especially is the housing problem critical. Many additional placements could have been made had there been living quarters available on various farms.

At the year's end a move is under way to work out a housing program, in order to attract and hold the better type of farm workers. Transient help is likely to be less plentiful in 1946, since more cars will become obsolete and taken off the highway.
