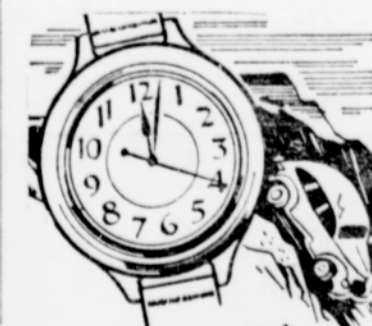
Stationed at San Diego
