Hilhi Trips Tillamook Quintet In TYV League Opener Friday

Hilhi got off to a winning start in the 1946 Tualatin-Yamhill valley league basketball race by edging out Tillamook high by 42 to 37 in a close battle on the Cheese-maker court Friday night, with Center Bob Amacher rolling in 25 points. The Spartans "B" team lost its game to the Tillamook "B" squad 27 to 26 in a heart-breaker.

The lanky Amacher was too much for the Tillamook defense, dunking a flock of close shots. He scored at least two field goals in each quarter, and rolled in four in a big second period.

Coach Don Kirisch's quintet trailed by three points at 14 to 11 after eight minutes of play, but out-scored Coach Russ Rary's team by five tallies in the second period to grab a narrow margin halftime lead of 22 to 20. With Amacher collecting eight of the 11 points.

The Spartans added another point to their lead in the third quarter to make the score 32 to 29, and tallied 10 more in the final period while the Cheese-makers were scoring only eight. Gaylon Gerard, forward, and Carl Jones, guard, were second in scoring for

Ellis Miller, the chap who holds high average in the Commercial league with 169, is another top-notch bowler whose experience started long before the days of the alley. He is remembered as a good-natured pin boy of a few seasons ago. His recent high series of 537, 513, 599, and 565 compare favorably with those of higher class.

The Spartans made quite a comeback to win their first TYV league game of the season. The Cheese-makers had "em down by 11 to 3 in the first period after a flashy opening in front of their home crowd. The psychological edge was supposedly all against Coach Don Kirisch's crew but they weren't to be stopped.

Both sides made most of the scoring of his 25-point evening against a zone defense, the Mooks not shifting to man-to-man until late in the game. The Tualatin men guarding the big center part of the time but he still persisted in dunking rebounds and passes from teammates.

The Vikings looked good in winning their league opener at Newberg, 44 to 37.

Coach Gene Duncan at Beaverton regards prospects for the season as "medium fair." He says: "It looks like McMinnville, Hillsboro, and West Linn for the championship." Wonder if he's trying to point the finger another direction so the boys won't point for his Beavers? Could Beaverton lost its opener to the Grizzlies by 13 points, but has shown up pretty well in spots.
